From West Indies.

The Elizabeth.

Schooner Elizabeth D. arrived at
Yarmouth last week with a cargo of

Sandy Point, Shelbourne county, un-
der charter to carry green fish and
pickled herring from South Shore
points to Boston and will commence
loadings as soon as she arrives at
Sandy Point.

Put into Halifax.

Str Bryssel (Dan), which left New
York on Dec. 30 for Tuborg, put into
Halifax a few days ago with several
of the crew suffering from influenza.
Three of those most seriously ill were
removed from the ship. One of them
is being transferred to the quarantine
hospital and the others are being taken
to the quarantine hospital.

Steamer Stranded.

London, Jan. 4.—The 3,000 tons
of cargo of str. Merida (Br.), stranded
off Point du Tonquet, France, Dec.
31, is being jettisoned in order to
float the vessel.

Removing Guns.

New York, Jan. 8.—All armed Amer-
ican merchant ships are having
their guns removed as rapidly as they
arrive in home ports from overseas,
according to an announcement of the
United States Shipping Board. The
gun crews are being transferred back
to their regular naval duties. The
gun emplacements on vessels operat-
ing by the Shipping Board—usually
heavy steel platforms on high sup-
ports at bow and stern—are being cut
away and dumped on the piers without
the business of commerce with prop-
er berth space again available. The
Board intends to use their merchant
vessels in a comprehensive programme
for training additional personnel re-
quired for many new ships that will
soon take the ways.

With the ships put on a basis de-

termining by peace conditions the Board
is not returning the ship crews to the
kind of quarters they were ac-
customed to before the war. It is in-
teresting to note that the crews quar-
ters at the bow of the ship, instead
of at the bow of the ship, have been
made necessary because of the danger
from mines. This arrangement has
been found so satisfactory that it will
be retained.

Quarters on each of the vessels of the

Shipping Board are being made
for apprentices and for four junior en-
gineers and four junior engineer
officers. The latter will be carried in
addition to the usual number of offi-
cers. The training of these men will
be carried on for three months' train-
ing, after which the maximum number
of junior officers before he receives his
license.
