PARLIAMENT'S WORK

Discusses the Lord's Day Bill and the Repeal of the Pensions Measure—Greatly Increased Wheat Shipments This Year Are Anticipated.

CONGRATULATIONS TO CANADIANS FOR WINNING KOLAPORE

Earl Grey, Sir Frederick Borden and Others Send Cablegrams—Scores in Saturday's Matches.

Bisley Camp, July 14.—Lt. Col. E. W. Wilson, the commander of the Canadian team, has received cablegrams congratulating upon the winning of the Kolapore Cup from Earl Grey, Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. J. M. G. Fitzgibbon, president of the Dominion Rifle Association; Lt. Col. Tilton, the officers of the Victoria Rifles and others.
