THE QUEBEC CENTRE ELECTION.—SHOOTING RIOTING.

KILLING, WOUNDING AND SACRIFICING. (From the Quebec Chronicle, Aug. 6.) Yesterday took place the polling in Quebec Centre and Quebec West. We will endeavor to record faithfully what took place at the polling-houses in the divisions.

THE CENTRE.

In the Centre Division it was announced that voting would begin at nine o'clock, and well was the promise adhered to. From the earliest hour the polling-houses were filled and votes polled in favor of both candidates, Messrs. Ross and Cauchon. There was no display of ill-feeling during the morning, and all went off peacefully, until at about eleven o'clock, when the Cauchon rowdies took possession of the polls in the suburban districts, and commenced to try to hold their usual carnival of bloodshed and riot.

THE FIGHT WEST ON.

The Union Jack had been taken in the last end, when Gaudin was killed, and the Green Flag yet remained, and the men surrounding it were determined upon not surrendering. They mustered around the banner, and some almost cried when they saw the inability of the police to keep the crowd below the level of the street.

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THE TURF.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 9.—The attendance at the races, to-day, was increased to 15,000. The weather was fine, and the track in good condition. In the first race, a pair of 25 horses, headed by a blood-red pacer who scored for the start, and in the first heat James H. Burke, who was ahead, dropped dead of heart disease on entering the homestretch. The race was won by Judge Fuller, in three straight heats, beating Lulu, Derby, Nonceuch and Triumph, in about the order named. Time, 2:35, 2:34, 2:35. The great race of the day, for all, was called at 4:30. The entries were Lucy, American Girl, Goldsmith Maid and Henry. Goldsmith Maid sold in the pool at \$400 to \$85 against the field. Before reaching the first turn in the first heat the Maid skipped and American Girl shot ahead and kept the lead to the half post, when she was overtaken by Lucy, who won the heat by a length. The Maid was second and the third Lucy. The second heat proved highly exciting and completely changed the current of public opinion. The horses started after considerable scoring, the Maid again leading, but breaking badly American Girl got the advantage and kept the same, being hotly pressed on the home stretch by Lucy and Goldsmith Maid, and coming in by half a length ahead, winning the heat in 2:17.

poor Gaudin, took deliberate aim and fired. The bullet struck him in the mouth, and he fell and died without a groan. He was picked up and carried to the Police Station just as the Provincial Police charged up the hill in a body, under the cover of bullets and stones. They separated the fighting parties, and by keeping the street, prevented them from joining and continuing the riot. The rioters, however, bravely, under command of Captains Heighan and Voyer, while Mr. Skellingford led a detachment through the thickest of the fire. But the fight went on at intervals, and though the police drove crowds, efforts were made by both parties to break through the lines and reach each other. They rushed round the corners howling and shrieking, while revolver shots whistled through the streets viciously, and stones fell and dropped on heads over the ground, in the most extraordinary manner.

CROWN PRINCE AT BUFFALO.

The following description of the trotting race at Buffalo on the 6th, in which Crown Prince figured so successfully, is taken from Walker's Spirit:— THE THIRD TROT was for the \$4,000 purse, for 240 horses, —\$3,000 to first, \$1,000 to second, \$500 to third and \$400 to fourth. There were ten entries, three of which were drawn, —Lady Maud, Stridaway and Gloster, (formerly Whirlwind) Those that started were the white gelding Crown Prince, sorrel gelding Star, black gelding Camors, bay gelding Ashland Pet, gray mare Grace, bay stallion Mambrino Star, and sorrel gelding Tom Walker. The first named had the call in the betting, he selling for \$100, Camors, \$85, and the field \$85. The first two heats were run in 2:38 and 2:34, and he came in first in the third. Those who had money on Camors now made an appeal to the judges; they declared it no heat, and Budd Doble was put up behind Camors. Many claimed that Budd Doble had pulled him and asserted that an arrangement had been made for a division of the purse. This was a little rough on Jack, such a charge as this, and must have hurt the feelings of this quickly and handsomely "normal" horse. In the third heat, with Budd Doble as his pilot, Camors altered the complexion of affairs, as he won readily in 2:38, Crown Prince second and Grace third.

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King's County Election. The performance concluded with a farce entitled "The Dominion Mail," which was a decided hit. On Thursday night Miss Kimball appears in her great character of "Cinderella of the Glass Slipper."
