London, July 22.  
A meeting which was attended by all members of the House of Commons and a large number of the majority of the House, was held last evening at the War Office, to discuss what measures should be adopted to secure the overthrow of the insurrectionary movements in the country, and the restoration of order.

Cortes has approved of the bill providing for the imposition of extraordinary war taxes. Persons known to be in sympathy with the Carlists are to be taxed heavily than those who are not. The minority of the Cortes issued a manifesto condemning the policy of the Government.

FRANCE.

The insurgent iron-clad Victoria was followed out of Alicante by a German man-of-war by order of the German Legation at Madrid.

The French Government has declared its neutrality in refusing a formal demand from Carlists for a recognition of their rights as belligerents.

It is officially announced that the insurgents in the State of Jalisco, Mexico, have been completely defeated and their leader, Jose, captured.
