In the agreement of the second to accomplish In Ireland, twenty-one Missionaries are statedly pursuing their toilsome course, and notwithstanding varied and multiplied discouragements, find ample reason to believe that their labour is not in vain in the Lord. The language employed by one of them, in his Annual Report, might be appropriately used by all. "Emigration and removals have thinned our ranks, but indications of good present themselves in many places; and in the name of our God, we will still lift up our banner." In the present state of that interesting country, the staff of labourers might be considerably increased, with the prospect of great usefulness. The extensive Mission of Lucan and Trim, which may be regarded as a fair sample of the whole, is a field which invites diligent culture, Our cause in some of the towns has not been in a better state at any former period. The members generally are growing in grace, and in divine knowledge. The congregations are regular in their attendance, and all seem to feel a deeper interest in the cause of Christ.

The Day Schools are 62 in number, and contain upwards of 3,700 scholars. "Of the good that these Schools are effecting," writes the General Superintendent, "mentally, morally, and spiritually, the half cannot be told." These Missions and Scholars are additional to the Society's Schools and Ministers belonging to the regular establishments of the Wesleyan Connexion in Ireland.
