REQUEST FOR WITHDRAWAL

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): Madam Speaker, we have just heard the Minister of Finance referring once again to policies in countries other than Canada and refusing to address the urgent need for his government to act in a way which will solve problems which his government has created here in Canada. A moment ago he said that his government wants to do and is doing everything possible to prevent increases in interest rates in this country. He knows that the National Energy Program is driving investment out of this country which could create jobs, investment which must earn high interest rates in order to be kept here or be brought back. Why, then, if he is doing everything possible, will he not withdraw or change the National Energy Program?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance): Madam Speaker, the hon. member has raised the question of the National Energy Program and has asked us to withdraw the program as a way of helping the current situation. The National Energy Program is an essential part of the policy of this government—

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. MacEachen: —because we believe that it is essential that Canadians get greater ownership and control of this strategic sector of our economy. That is our belief, and the right hon. gentleman—

REQUEST FOR WITHDRAWAL OF BUDGET MEASURES

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): The Acting Prime Minister, the Minister of Finance, knows that his program has bankrupted Canadian energy industries and has aided only the Arabs.
