We used to be able to sit outside in the summer with our dog on a long chain but not any more. Now we have all kinds of dogs — large and small - running around our

yard.

I pity any child that got in their way. He could be knocked down and heaven only knows what could happen after that.

People just don't realize the harm their dogs are doing to property — in fact a open their back door and let Rover out to do his thing on somebody else's property. If

these people were true dog lovers they would not let their pets run wild.

It is time the laws con-cerning dogs who run wild are changed. This includes the animal shelter. I think each house in a new sub-division should have a fence so children and dogs can play on their own property in safety. Or perhaps there should be stiffer fines for dogs who are picked up — \$100 for the first time, \$200 thereafter. The fine now is far too little

As a dog lover I was against picking up stray dogs for research but after seeing so many dogs killed and squashed on the high-ways I would rather see them picked up and put to
