 with them for a number of
 years, and had not received
 scrip nor treaty at any
 agency.

His family consists of himself,
 his wife Emily's niece, one boy,
 two girls, and his mother.
 Total six.

Should the Department decide
 to admit this man and family
 to treaty, would he be allowed
 arrears for 1900? On account
 of his making application first
 in 1900.

When paying treaty at
 Lac la Piche, the Indian had
 Samuel Tahkechin, aged fourteen
 applied for his annuity money
 with No. 29. Stating that he
 had received treaty with the
 family.
