It is considered that the Council might locate to one individual such area of land as might be thought proper, having in view the locality and the requirements of the individual; that in some cases it might be advisable only to locate a garden plot and in others sufficient land for a farm; but the Department is not disposed to approve of any allotment greater than eighty acres, and it will be necessary to have locations consist of whole, half or quarter lots, so that you or any member of the Council can make the necessary divisions. The list which should be prepared and covered by resolutions of the Indians should give clearly and distinctly the name of the Indian locatee, the number of the lot, the portion of the lot, and the area thereof, so that there may be no difficulty whatever in preparing location tickets.
