come over their condition. Their aimless, godless hopeless life is over. They are inside the fold, and in lowship with the people of God; they have come under provision of the Divine covenant; they have an object their life, a mission worthy of their nature, a hopemakes the future bright and attractive. They are "migh."

But mark how they were made nigh. By what me was this great change accomplished? It was by no ef of their own. It was not by reforming their lives, or the adoption of new and better principles or entering u the pursuit of a nobler and worthier purpose. Th things are good and have their place, but they can ne bring sinners nigh to God. The apostle states distinct that they " are made nigh by the blood of Christ." T alone has done it. The sacrificial death of Jesus Chri has put mankind into new relations with God, by remo ing the barrier which separated them, and bridging chasm. It was sin that alienated man from God. It sin that separates the heathen from Him to-day, and the separates the sinner in Christian lands from God and fro But the blood of Christ has remov He hath once appeared to put away sin by t sacrifice of Himself." (Heb. 9:26). That work was do on the cross, and by that the "far off" were "ma nigh." Let as never imagine that we are nigh to Go because of our improved lives. Every moment of fellow ship that we have with God, and with His people, eve service we are permitted to render; every enjoyment His watch-care in the vicisitudes of life; every experience of peaceful rest in Him; and every throb of joyful hop
