Resolution to Re-Appeint the Committee Was Carried.

Kingsten, June 14.—One of the greatest questions that has accupied the attention of the Presbyterian General Asembly came up yesterday afternoon in that of church union.

In the absence of Dr. Ward, the vice-convenor, Principal Patrick, of Winnipes, presented the committee report, which recited the proceedings of the joint conference last December and recommended that the presbytery committee be reappointed, substituting names for those who have since died. Dr. Patrick said the work had just begun, some departments of it not even that. The committee had taken the stand that they should not ask the church to give any decision until the committee had exhausted every possible question that might arise. Each congregation should assist by discussing the question themselves. There must be no union at the cost of disminon, All the members of the three churches must be carried, if possible, on to the united church. He was not unhopeful of union. Rev. Dr. Murray of Hallfax seconded the motion to adopt the report, which after discussion, was put and carried.
