

London, Nov. 13 .- Hon. Mr. Fos ter, speaking at Sunderland last night, declared that the tariff question must be settled, not by the opinions of the dead, but in a practical, common-sense fashion by the empire's workingmen. "Night and day a tariff war against Great Britain wages ceaselessly. Every country in Europe has industrial spies at work in Britain. The colonies are looking forward to everlasting life, and if Britain heeds their call that will be attained. Do not run away with the

if Britain heeds their call that will be attained. Do not run away with the idea that the United States is the only rooster across the Atlantic. There is a young cock who can crow, if need be, just as lustily. After all she has lost by the Alaska award Canada still possesses 100,000 more acres than the United States. While Minister of Finance for Canada I made one tariff and revised two, and I give my word that if Britain adopts protection the foreigner, and not the consumer, will pay."

Sir Edward Grey, speaking at West Bromwich last night, said:—"We are not alone in trade depression. Free trade has been a greater bulwark of British shipping than all the subsidies of foreign Governments. Remember that Canada has not asked us to abandon our free trade policy, and in Australia the vast body of public opinion is against it. Protection arguments have been refuted over and over again; last, but not least, by two young dandies who have escaped safely from the lion's den, and have goon back to London to support Premier Balfour just so long as he does not formally promulgate his fiscal policy."
