THE "GRAND NIGHT."

THE KING DINES AS A BENCHER OF THE MIDDLE TEMPLE.

Has Dined in the Hall During Its Four Conturies' Existence-Coremonies Concorated With Inn's Plate, Some of It

The grandest "grand night" in the history of the Middle Temple was that of Nov. 2, when the King dined in the hall as a Bencher of that ancient and honorable society. It is the first occasion, so far as is known that a reigning. Socration has direct the first occasion, so far as is known that a reigning Sovereign has dined in the hall during its four centuries' existence. The King, wearing his silk gown, entered the hall with Sir Robert Finlay, the Temple's treasurer. They headed a procession of 40 Benchers, preceded by the chief poitter (Mr. T. Dather) in his robes, bearing a long chony staff and a mallet.



The band of the Royal Artillery, placed behind the handsome oak placed behind the handsome oak screen erected in 1574 played the National anthem as the Bencher's took their seats at a raised table with the King on the left of the Attorney-General. This table was decorated with the Inn's plate, some of which dates from the reign of Charles II. After dinner the Royal Bencher each his follows: adjourned to cher and his fellows adjourned to the Parliament Chamber for dessert and cigars. Usually these duxuries are reserved for the Benchers; the ordinary members do not get dessert; but under the unprecedented circum-stances precedent was for once departed from.

He was appointed Colonial Secretary to British Honduras (1894), and administered the Government of that Colony to 1897. In January of the year following he was appointed Acting Senior Clerk at the Colonial Office, retaining that position till 1899.
