## Farmers' Market Letter

Editorial of the English Grain-Supervisors Limited, Winnipeg, August 26, 1918.

The grain of the American corn and oats markets were the controlling factor in the grain market last week. During the early part of the week, American prices advanced in response to the demand for grain by the corn crop in certain areas. This gave a former tone to our Canadian markets until later in the week when the American had a downward turn. There is very little doing in the local market, either in case or futures.

**WHEAT**—There is no change in wheat stocks at 1,700,000 bushels. Lower grades have not been taken all week. There is very little doing as the new crop has not yet begun to move. C.S.A. has declined nine cents per bushel during the week, following the action of the American markets.

Minneapolis, August 23, 1918.

CORNS.—Demand limited to certain grades, milling varieties show No. 3 yellow closed at \$1.78 to \$1.81; No. 4 yellow at \$1.72 to \$1.77.

OATS.—Lower, with extra-largely at September prices to half-cent under. No. 2 white closed at \$0.94 to \$0.97 cents; No. 4 white oats at \$0.51 to \$0.54 cents.

RYE.—Easy and three to four cents lower. No. 2 rye closed at \$1.70 to \$1.72.

BARLEY.—Sales largely at one to two cents under yesterday's prices. One sale of choice at one cent over yesterday's top.

PEAS AND BEANS.—Weak, and 10 cents lower. No. 1 seed closed at \$1.28 to \$1.41, snapshot and to arrive.

The Dominion Board of Grain Supervisors issued on Friday last their order fixing the price of the 1918 wheat crop at \$2.24 per bushel. They issued also an order imposing an embargo on the shipment of grain from Alberta.

That the maximum allowance the purchaser may make the seller for sacks shall be on the basis of \$1.00 per ton, and that if the purchaser does not require the said sacks those shall be returned to the seller of the wheat at the latter's expense.

That the above actions have no legal authority and any deviations from them will be regarded and treated as violations of the orders of the Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada.

Order Regarding Alberta

The orders placing an embargo on all Alberta grain reads as follows:

### Order No. 52

The Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada

Restricting shipments of grain—Alberta

It is hereby ordered by the Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada that no grain shall be shipped out of the province of Alberta and that no grain shall be transferred by any railway company inside the province of Alberta without a permit from the Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada.

This prohibition is for the purpose of providing a sufficient supply of good seed grain for the province.

A sufficient supply of grain for local consumption other than seed.

This embargo will be continued until the proper authorities have had an opportunity to provide seed grain, or until the actual receipts of grain in the country elevators warrant the removal of the embargo.
