WATERWORKS

N Tuesday next, May 23, the rate-payers of St. Andrews will vote on the question of the Town entering into an agreement with the Canadian Pacific Railway for a supply of water. The details of the offer of the C. P. R., and of the proposed method of installing the waterworks in the Town, have been published in the BEACON, and we think the Ratepayers are more or less familiar with the same. The scheme appears to us to be a reasonable one, and if it is adopted it is altogether likely that a permanent Board of Commissioners would be appointed to supervise the work in its inception and in its future operation. The Ratepayers would naturally insist upon their interests being safeguarded in this way.

The occasion of the vote is an important one, and upon the result will depend the Town's welfare and progress. We all know, only too well, how little progress can be effected with the inadequate water supply the Town now possesses.
