NEWS FROM NORFOLK COUNTY

NORFOLK COUNCIL FINISHES WORK

Forenoon Session This Morning Completes its Business

Simcoe, Jan. 26.—(From Our Own Correspondent)—Although the meeting of the County Patriotic Association, held usually during an afternoon session of council, was this year held at an evening session, the county council failed to get through last night and adjourned to meet this morning at 9 o'clock.

Communications.

(1) From H. Frank Cook, B. A., re inspection of schools, showing 22 visits during year, seven more than required by regulation.

(2) From the Road Engineer of Elgin County, citing readiness to pay share on construction of a new bridge between Balham and Houghton.

Report on Industrial Farm and House

Chairman McPherson read the report recommending: (1) Metal siding for the pantry and metal ceiling for the chapel; repairs to the chapel organ and the enclosing of the tank loft.

(2) The painting of the hog pen. (3) A better burial for deceased adults in oper caskets and outside cases to be supplied.

The report contained also the following data, regarding stock and fodder: There are 10 pigs, 10 cows, some giving milk, two horses one of which should be sold and a better one purchased in its place. Fodder and feed sufficient for the remainder of the winter.

There are 40 male and 23 female inmates. Two of the later are ill and are requiring much service from the staff.

The whole Institution is faithfully and ably administered. Registry Office Closes at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Reeve McSloy introduced the by-law to close the registry office Saturday afternoons from one o'clock to two o'clock, and the same was adopted.

The treasurer's bonds were reported satisfactory and the report of the committee appointed to examine the same was adopted.

Committee on Salaries. Chairman MacIn reported recommending an increase of \$50.00 in the treasurer's salary. The report was adopted.

Public Buildings Require Roofing. Chairman Welsh reported the gas and court house well and carefully kept and the work of those responsible well and carefully done.

At present there are three male prisoners confined and three at large. Committee had examined the door of the cell from which the prisoners escaped.

Turnkey Not to Blame. There has been such a settlement in the door and the lock in the wall as to permit of prisoners escaping. The turnkey had visited the corridor shortly before midnight and had found all secure. They recommended: (1) Repairs to this cell door and adjustment of the lock.

(2) A new gas stove for the residence kitchen. (3) New roof for dwelling and turnkey's quarters, and repairs to roof at registry office.

(4) Curtains for shelves in Registry office. (5) One dozen chairs for various offices. (6) Re-adjustment of lights in Judge's chamber and in Engineer's office.

The report was referred to the committee of the whole. Council went into committee of the whole at 3.24.

The matter of the claim of M. Mason for damages to cutter was recommended to be referred back to the Jan. session, to give the engineer an opportunity to report.

Re-Cameron and Pake claim for damages re auto accident, recommended that no action be taken and in case of action the same be accepted and the country's interests defended.

Re Windham's orphan and request for \$130 for up-keep, committee recommended no action. Children's Aid Appeal. The committee recommended a grant of \$250, and three dollars a week allowance for children in the shelter and that the Windham babe be taken to the shelter.

The committee arose at 4.30 and the council resumed its sitting. Messrs. Welsh, the clerk and county engineer were appointed to carry out the recommendations of the committee which were adopted as presented.

Sale of June 1917 Debentures. Mr. Duncombe reported re the sale of the June 1917 issue of Patriotic Fund debentures which were given to A. E. Ames & Co. the highest bidder for \$70,984 and accrued interest. The report was received and placed on file.

The amount of the cheque placed to the credit of the county's general over-draft was \$71,647.81. It is assumed that the difference represents the interest accrued from the date of sale till the date of the payment. Council adjourned at 5 o'clock to meet at 9 a.m. to-day.

While the Food Controller has not established a price for the new grade of flour, it is generally understood by the millers that the price for Manitoba flour will be around \$11.10 per barrel, earload basis. Some mills are already looking on this basis at any rate. In some instances mills have started to grind the new grade of flour. Rolled oats continue in firm market with a general advance recorded on the part of the manufacturers of package oats.

One of the important advances to be recorded during the week was that on canned pork and beans, and canned meat with a general advance recorded on the part of the manufacturers of package oats.

One of the refiners reduced the price of sugar to the basis of the two refiners who had previously reduced. An embargo on the shipment of sugar from the United States is likely to be only a temporary measure by way of relieving the freight situation. Canadian sugar men anticipate there will not be any serious consequences to the Canadian trade, as there are some stocks of Victoria and other grades in all probability be sufficient to meet requirements until the embargo is again lifted.

There is a strong undertone to the tea situation, due to the high freight rates now prevailing on the Pacific Ocean. Stocks of teas in Canada have been fairly heavy recently and this has held the market in an easy position for some time past. Lima beans were lower in price in some quarters.

Storage butter was in firmer market during the week. New-laid eggs are arriving in better quantity and the price on this grade was lower. Storage eggs are getting within narrow compass and the price on this grade showed a higher range. Poultry supplies are light with very little being shipped to distributing centres. Margarine is in good demand, but supplies procurable from the United States have not been sufficient to completely satisfy the trade. Dusted in grocery lines has been seasonably good during the week.
