"GAT" HOWARD KILLED

The despatch announcing the above from Lord Kitchener was received with deep regret in Canada and other places where the brave man was known. He met his death on February 17th but details have not as yet been received. Many interesting accounts of the different battles which he had been in have been sent home by the boys. They show that he was a reckless fighter and more than once put himself into dangerous positions. He enjoyed fighting for its own sake and how he escaped from dangerous fires which he so often invited is a miracle. On the departure of the Canadians from South Africa he organized a corps of Canadian scouts and was leading them when he met death. It was with this brave soldier that our brave and gallant Rob Ryan served and as he is next in command he will probably fill the vacancy.

NEW SENATORS

During the late years the newspaper fraternity has been called upon and from its ranks several editors have been chosen to fill the vacancies in the Senate caused by death. Of these are Mr. Templeman of the Victoria Times and Dr. Ellis of the St. John Globe. The death of Senator Almon of Halifax has left another vacancy and by the present indications this will be filled by a literary man.

It has been proposed to appoint Mr. C. C. Blackadder, manager of the Acadian Recorder, Halifax, the ancient liberal organ. The proposal seems to meet the approval of our Liberal brothers. Wealthy Liberals are being appointed so that when election time falls the party will be financially supported. In the case of Mr. Blackadder he is a wealthy property owner and a bank director.

He is well known and has travelled extensively, was mentioned as a probable lieutenant governor for Nova Scotia. The position fell to Hon. A. G. Jones who had a claim based on long and important political service and sacrifice and who until Mr. Fielding's time was the leader of his party in Nova Scotia. Mr. Blackadder who is a much younger man would probably prefer the senatorship which would be likely to last longer.

The eastern part of the province is well represented and many approve of the idea that the senator to fill the vacancy, caused by the death of Senator Almon, be chosen from the central or western part of

the province, which has only one senator. Many others believe in the Senate Reform and instead of appointing him let the people vote for the man whom they wish to be represented by, as it is today the people have nothing to say. The Senate has done much good work but it has nevertheless blocked legislation coming from the responsible representatives of the people.
