A contract was let last week for carrying Uncle Sam's mail in Alaska by dog-sleds. The successful bidder was Oscar Fish, and his route lies between Eagle and Valdez, a distance of 414 miles. He makes two trips a month and receives nearly \$1,500 a trip, or \$35,-000 a year. Only 300 pounds are carried per trip, and this is usually made up of letters, few newspapers.
