BOY CLIMBED A STALK AND IS NOW OUT OF SIGHT.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 15.—(Communicated).—A report from Lee's Summit, Mo., tells of a right turn of fate. The story is told by a Lees Summit paper and illustrates the terrible dangers that menace Kansas by reason of the tremendous corn crop.

International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Joshua and Caleb. Jos. 14; 5, 15.

Golden Text—"He wholly followed the Lord."

After a campaign of six years, these two old comrades, Caleb and Joshua, aged 85 and 90, met to arrange Caleb's inheritance. They were two of the most honored men of God, and his soldiers in all Israel. Their strength and their faith had not failed and they were full of physical and spiritual vigor. Caleb was a sort of Jack the giant killer toward the fierce and mighty Anakim giants of Mount Hebron. Complete consecration and abandonment to the will of God is the secret of that faith that makes a strong heart and life. You say, "Oh, if I had only more faith." If we give ourselves up fully to God we will soon have all the faith we like as it is done in heaven. In obeying God like Caleb we are putting our foot down on what becomes to us a spiritual experience, a possession, while disobedience and unbelief, resistance to obey loses, the inheritance and blessing. Israel fought the enemies of God and man in Canaan with carnal weapons. The church overcomes the enemies of God and man by the spiritual, by the sword of the spirit and in the whole armour of God we are insured victory, just as much as Caleb and Joshua.
