NEW PROPRIETOR

Kent Bakery, Formerly Conducted by W. S. Richards on the Market Square Passes Into Hands of Ex-Ald. E. A. Mounteer.

A business change of note occurred this morning when ex-Ald. E. A. Mounteer assumed charge of the Kent Bakery on the market square and W. S. Richards, the former proprietor, stepped out. Mr. Richards is one of the new proprietors of the Hotel Garner and found it necessary to relinquish his confectionery business.

In doing so he breaks the chain of succession in an old and well-known business. His uncle, the late Henry Richards, established the business in ye years of Our Lord 1849. From his hands it passed to those of the late Wm. Richards and thence to his son, the retiring proprietor. As befits such an anciently established stand its popularity is quite commensurate with its age.

The succeeding proprietor, ex-Ald. E. A. Mounteer, is a well and favorably known Chathamite. For 25 years he has been in business here, conducting the meat business near the corner of King and William streets, from which he retired about a year ago. Mr. Mounteer has, as the prefix to his name implies, borne his share of the burden of civic gov-

ernment. For over six years he held various responsible chairmanships in the City Council with satisfaction to the municipality and credit to himself.

As a business man Mr. Mounteer established such a favorable name for himself that all who, then, came in contact with him are pleased to learn of his return to the commercial mart. The reputation he, then, established is sufficient guarantee that in the business he now succeeds to he will be an unqualified success.

ARCHIE NAMED

Former West Kent Member will be Canada's Next Minister of Trade and Commerce.

Ottawa, August 6.—Of the three cabinet ministers mentioned in the organs of the English-speaking Liberals as slated to go out of office next month, Messrs. Scott, Cartwright and Fitzpatrick, the first-named had not been consulted on the subject when the report was given to the public, and the friends of Mr. Fitzpatrick have made it abundantly clear that they resent the announcement, which they regard as premature and calculated to create the impression that the minister is being forced out before ready to go.

Mr. Lemieux, solicitor-general, is, according to the same sources, to succeed Mr. Scott as secretary of state, and Mr. Archie Campbell, of Toronto, to become minister of trade and commerce in the place of Sir Richard Cartwright. Mr. Hugh Guthrie or Mr. Leighton MacCarthy are spoken of as candidates for the solicitor-generalship.

Each of the retiring ministers, under the salary scheme put through in the closing hours of the late session of parliament, will receive \$6,000 a year, \$2,500 as members of either house of parliament and \$3,500 as retired members of the cabinet.

THE BIG GAME

The final lacrosse game between Chatham and St. Thomas at London next Wednesday promises to be the best attended game of the season. Many are going to accept this opportunity of visiting the London old boys reunion, and it is quite probable that a number of ladies will take in the trip.

There are at present about 10,000 old boys in London and it is expected that by Friday fully 30,000 will be there. The city has been well billed for the game and there should be a bumper crowd to see it.

As far as the game itself is concerned, Chatham should have no difficulty in winning. Quesset will be back at point and the home will be considerably strengthened. The boys are now holding afternoon practices at the agricultural grounds every day and are getting into the best possible shape.

Already several enquiries have been made to Mr. McCoig for train tickets and there will no doubt be a big contingent from Chatham.
