Kingston, Jamaica, Feb. 20.—Gov. Swettenham announced at the meeting of the legislative council today that he had urged the Imperial Government to make a grant of \$750,000 gratis, and a loan of \$5,000,000 to help the merchants rebuild commercial sections of Kingston. The loan is to be without colonial guarantee.

Montreal, Feb. 21.—Arthur Foster of Alma, N. B., who was so badly beaten in McGill university boxing contest, last night, that he lost consciousness immediately afterwards and had to be taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital, is said "to be much more comfortable," but that is about the extent of the information which the hospital will give out and his classmates say that he still is in danger.

Richibucto, Feb. 20.—Mrs. Day, who some days ago was seized with paralysis, died on Saturday at the residence of her son-in-law, Dr. H. C. Merreseau. At 10 o'clock Saturday night the Kent Northern Railway sent out a special in order that the relatives might be permitted to convey her body to Ontario for interment.

London, Feb. 20.—The text of Sir Charles Dilke's bill to enfranchise women was passed by the House of Commons today. It provides for enfranchising every man and woman of full age residing in the district where an election, either parliamentary or local is being held, and no one shall be debarred by sex or marriage from being elected to a political function whatever. It is similar to the Bill Sir Charles introduced last year and which was defeated.

Chicago, Feb. 20.—When the National Woman's Suffrage Association next meet the society will have a paid membership of \$8,000, with many more persons pledged to support its aims. The National Women's Suffrage Society closed its session here last night.

Montreal, Feb. 21.—A dozen policemen, headed by two S. P. C. A. inspectors, raided a dog fight in a barn on Papineau Road last night, and made fifteen arrests. Not a span escaped, because the barn was surrounded. It took the inspectors twenty minutes to separate the dogs.

Chatham, N. B., Feb. 21.—The two-year-old child of James Larry Hill Street, was burned to death yesterday, while Mrs. Barry was in another part of the house. The child's clothes caught fire from the kitchen stove and before it was discovered the child was so badly burned that it died two hours later.

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—In the Supreme Court Tuesday morning decision was given in the case of Cushing vs. the Cushing Sulphite Co. The appeal was dismissed with costs. This is the last of the famous Cushing case and the verdict sustains the equity "decision of Judge Barker that Mr. Cushing collected only what was due him in his transactions with the company.

Washington, Feb. 20.—Four years' contest against Reed Smoot being permitted to retain his seat as a senator of the United States from Utah, was ended today by 42 of his colleagues voting to sustain him as against 28 for the resolution to unseat him. Added to this there were eighteen senators paired, making the actual standing on the resolution 51 votes against it and 37 for it. Senator Smoot himself did not vote, and Senator Wetmore was absent and not paired.

100 YEARS OLD. Mr. Francis Harvey of 71 Lombard street St. John, was 100 years old on the 21st. Up to last year he was quite able to do his own shopping, but lately his sight and hearing have somewhat failed and he has kept indoors. Mr. Harvey lived in English Settlement till six years ago, when he came to live with his daughter, Mrs. Jenner. He was born in England, and came to this country in 1813. He remembers when the site of the Union depot was a millpond, and has shot wildfowl along a stream that ran near the old cemetery now in the heart of the city.
