A WARNING TO THE PUBLIC RE PRINCE RUPERT

A notice with the above heading appeared in the "Vancouver World" signed by the Prince Rupert Townsite Company, 43 Fairfield Building, Vancouver. A statement is therein made that their property is the original and only legal Prince Rupert, and the Railway Company own 4,000 to 5,000 acres of arable land immediately surrounding the same.

The above statement is misleading and incorrect as the only townsite registered are: South Prince Rupert, owned it is understood by the company who signed the above warning, and the Townsite of Prince Rupert at the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway situated at the North-West of Kaien Island. The distance between these two townsites is over eleven miles, and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company is not in any way interested in South Prince Rupert, nor is it the intention to have as attention at that place.

East Prince Rupert so-called in various reports which have appeared in the press, is not registered; the subdivision referred to is situated over 10 miles from the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and is not on the line of that railway.

The Prince Rupert at the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is now being surveyed, and it is expected the lots will be placed in the market in September or October next, due notice of which will appear in the public press. Any further information the public may require can be obtained by addressing the Land Commissioner of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway at Winnipeg.

MONCTON, Friday.—The post office at Pettitodac was burglarized last night, about twenty five dollars being stolen. The post office is kept in the store conducted by David Mann and this was broken into during the night. Between fifteen and twenty dollars in silver and six in coppers was taken while a large quantity of postage stamps were left.

Scarcely a night passes in Moncton without attempted burglaries and suspicious characters are being rounded up. The sale of firearms has greatly increased in the city within the past few days and burglars are likely to get a warm reception.

LATER

ST. JOHN, Friday.—Patrick Phelan who gives his birthplace as Halifax, is held by the police tonight on suspicion of being the man who burglarized the post office at Pettitodac. Phelan tells contradictory stories, and considerable small change is found on his person.

MANITOBA WANTS MONEY

OTTAWA, Friday.—In the House of Commons today the Prime Minister told Mr. Borden that on Monday he would state what legislation would be passed before the end of the session and that of the government bills would be presented early in the week. In the case of the bill to extend Manitoba boundaries, that the province had changed its application for extension of boundaries by adding a demand for a money allowance in lieu of lands as was given Saskatchewan and Alberta. Mr. Borden decided that he was in favor of closing the session as early as possible. The House then went into committee on the election bill.

CUMBERLAND WOODS BURNING

AMHERST, Friday.—Forest fires have been raging with terrific force for two days, destroying much timber property. It is now heading towards valuable timber property of Black & McKinnon. No effort was made to control the fire until this morning, when chief fire ranger, R. Byron Atkinson, Amherst, was notified and has left for the scene to take action.

TRAMPS MORE NUMEROUS THAN EVER.

Yesterday morning Inspector Noble of the I. C. R. received word that seven tramps were on the fast freight train, No. 76, enroute to Campbellton. He at once took Constable Saville with him to Moffat's Station and there awaited the arrival of the train. When the train was slowing down for the station the seven tramps jumped off, and after a hot chase the officers got five of them which they brought to town and locked up. These will appear before Police Magistrate Matheson in the morning.

Mr. Noble says that never since he has been on the road has there been so many hobos along the line of railway. Most of them are coming from the West, where they say they are unable to find work. But he thinks the greater part of them are from across the border and are mostly of the kind that do not want to work. The fact of so many of these fellows being at large accounts for so many robberies in the neighboring towns.

FRENCH TREATY IN PERIL

OTTAWA, Thursday.—In the House today Mr. Foster asked for information in regard to the position of the Franco-Canadian treaty of commerce. The Finance Minister replied that he had no official information as to the present position of the treaty. It had already passed the Chamber of Deputies but had not as yet received the approval of the Senate, and therefore stands for further consideration. The Senate has to adjourn today. Mr. Fielding mentioned also that objection had been taken to the treaty by certain French industries.

CAMPBELLTON MAN

ST. JOHN, Friday.—At a meeting of the hospital commissioners today Dr. W. Everett Gray, of Campbellton, was appointed senior resident physician of the hospital in succession to Dr. Malcolm, resigned. Dr. Edward J. Ryan and Dr. Jenkins were appointed to the staff.

Dr. Gray is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Gray of Campbellton and is a graduate of McGill.

MANY MINERS KILLED BY XPLOSION

Hundreds of Men Caught in Rikovsky Mine at Yousov, Russia.

YUSOV, European Russia, Friday.—Fire broke out in the Rikovsky mine, which yesterday was the scene of an explosion of gas that resulted in a heavy loss of life. The work of rescue and fighting the fire is being conducted under the greatest difficulties. Over 200 men remain down in the mine shut in by falling earth, while 160 bodies have already been brought out.

Seventy five wounded were removed to the hospitals and of these ten are now dead and many more are dying. It is believed that the present number of dead will be increased by seventy five. The explosion occurred just after the night shift entered the mine. The last twenty men of the shift were still in the cage at the bottom of the shaft and they were drawn to the surface uninjured. Rescue parties were at once organized and commenced to go down. Six of the rescuers were suffocated. Others bravely continued the work. In the meantime five thousand miners who had gathered at the head of the shaft became so excited that troops had to be summoned. They cleared the ground and today allow only members of the families of the victims to come within their cordon.

Heartrending scenes are witnessed as mangled bodies of dead men are being brought to the surface and given over to bereaved women. Many of the wounded are mad from the shock. The cause of the explosion is not known.

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, Monday.—Just as the party of ladies were about to get into the motor car of Parks Commissioner W. L. Doran at Niagara Falls, Ont., shot ahead thru a stout railing over the escarpment in front of the Queen's Royal Hotel and plunged into Niagara River with the chauffeur in it.

By miracle, Driver Thomas Small came out of the water unhurt and the only damage done the machine was a break in the front axle. The bank is sixty feet high.

The party were going to see the military review and Mr. Doran ordered his man to move ahead about six feet. Something went wrong.

A message was sent to camp and a company of army engineers were ordered from the review to haul out the wreck. A second message to the effect that the local life saving crew had hauled the car ashore stopped them. This evening the army engineers went down and hauled it to the top of the bank. It can be easily repaired and will be running Monday.

The ladies whose ride was spoiled were Mrs. Major F. W. Hill, Mrs. Col. W. W. Thompson and Miss Doran of Niagara Falls.
