ERADICATE GLANDERS. British Authorities Restrict Importation of Horses. Ottawa, Oct. 6.-A despatch has been received by His Excellency from the Imperial Board of Agriculture stating that with a view to securing the eradication from Great Britain of the disease of glanders in horses it has been decided that no horse, ass or mule shall be landed in Great Britain unless accompanied by the certificate of a veterinary surgeon that the animal shows no symptom of glanders or farcy.

SHIP'S BOW LAUNCHED. Will Replace Part Lost by Liner on the Rocks. Belfast, Ireland, Oct. 6.-A most remarkable launch occurred here yesterday morning, when the new bow built for the new White Star line steamer Suevic, to replace the one left at Starogor, near the Lizard, on March 17 last, slid into the water. The Suevic, riding a fog near the rocks, and after long and ineffectual attempts to refloat her, the salvers cut away the forepart, refloated the rest of the ship and towed it to Southampton, where it is now in dock and ready to receive the new bow.
