Mr. ARTHUR NEWBURY has returned with an experienced landscape gardener, selected in Halifax from a number of applicants. This man has had extensive practical acquaintance with the culture of fruit and ornamental trees, and also with the laying out and management of public parks, private grounds, &c., on both sides of the Atlantic. While in Halifax Mr. Newbury visited the Public Gardens there, and put himself in communication with Mr. Stephen, chairman of the Park Committee, who expressed great pleasure at the movement going on in Charlottetown, and offered any assistance in his power to forward the good work, and promised that he would furnish as a free gift any suitable plants and shrubs that might be available, out of their surplus stock, which is often very considerable. It may probably be too late this spring to take much advantage of this kind offer, but it is open for the future, and the worthy chairman and his committee certainly deserve the hearty thanks of our citizens for it. The head gardener, Mr. Power, must not be forgotten in this connection, as his courtesy and kindness to Mr. Newbury, and his promise to select and plant out after the shipment of the surplus plants have materially facilitated matters. Work has been temporarily suspended on the flower beds &c., which, in view of the advanced season, have to be finished as quickly as possible.

The *People's Advocate* of the 24th May, published at County Monaghan, Ireland, contains a lengthy notice of the death of Rev. Peter Longhran, for the past ten years Parish Priest of Tempo, which occurred on the 20th May at Rosetree, after a severe and protracted illness. His remains were interred at the Parish Church, Tempo, on the 23rd May. We quote as follows from the *Advocate*: "The Rev. deceased, who had scarcely completed his 60th year, was not less admired for his rare gifts of mind than he was loved for his friendly and affectionate nature. His early career, both at school and at college, furnished a bright record of intellectual triumphs. Too soon, however, for the completion of his collegiate course, his health was suddenly undermined in Maynooth by a severe illness, from the sad ravages of which he never afterwards recovered. Though many, even beyond his physical powers, in discharge of his ministerial duties, yet he seemed habitually to turn his thoughts to the sanctification of his own life, and the admonition of St. Paul: 'Take heed to thyself and to doctrine.' Mysteries in their reality and in the ways in which God chooses to be glorified in His servants. Not less verified now than in the beginning of Christianity, are the words addressed by our Lord to His disciples: 'You have not chosen me, but I have chosen you.' It is devoutly to be hoped that, in the presence of a holy and happy death, and in the crowning glory which such a death is the passage, the Rev. deceased has now received the reward of a life chastened by long suffering and sanctified by holy obediences." The deceased cleric had many relatives in this Province. The late Bernard Longhran, of Orwell, and Francis Longhran, of Fort Augustus, were his uncles.

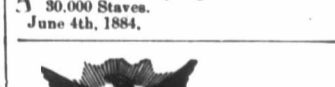
