This annual Statement of the Bank of Montreal shows that the earnings for the past year have been at the rate of 10 per cent. \$75,000 are carried forward to next year.

The Quebec Local Cabinet has been re-organized as follows:—Mercier, Premier and Commissioner of Agriculture; Turcotte, Attorney General; Garsneau, Minister of Public Works; Duhamel, Minister of Crown Lands; Gagnon, Provincial Secretary; Shewan, Treasurer. Mr. Ross remains nominally a Minister without a portfolio. With this single exception there is no English speaking representative in the Cabinet, either Irish Catholic or Protestant.
