Will Be Docked.
The ore steamer Phoenix will be docked for repairs. Mr. E. G. Rendell, agent for the Cape Copper Co., received orders last evening from the owners to have the cargo removed and the ship put on the dock.

Deer Stalking Expedition.
Capt. A. Barbour, Dr. Smith and Magistrate Millin left Greenspond a couple of days ago for Gambo and will go up country shooting. They took Alan Pond with them as cook, guide, and hope to secure their complement of heads.

The Phoenix Repairs.
The tug Ingraham stood by the Phoenix all yesterday in the stream, and the powerful steam pumps owned by the tug Co. were kept going on the ship and kept the holds free of water. The ship will be berthed to-day at the dock pier, and it is likely the cargo will be taken out to effect repairs.

Big Sea Running.
Yesterday a tremendous sea ran all around the coast, and here in the harbor there was an abnormally high tide. Capt. N. Kean who arrived from Greenspond yesterday in his schooner with fish reports that the shoals in some places broke for miles around, and he did not see such a heavy sea for several years past.

Buying Fish North.
A good deal of the fish caught north the past summer will not be brought here by the owners. At Greenspond an neighbourhood some collectors are offering \$6.40 for large merchantable fish and \$5.60 for small. All are willing to sell at these figures as they save the labor of shipping and also the freight.

Latest Cable News.
Special Evening Telegram.
BRUSSELS, Nov. 21.—The condition to-day of Queen Elizabeth who is ill with bronchitis, is serious.

Paris, Nov. 21.—The River Seine was falling slightly again to-day. The flood has caused heavy losses to property owners bordering on the river because of dampness.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—Dr. Crippen's petition for a reprieve was denied to-day by the Home Secretary announcing that he declined to interfere with the sentence of the Court. Crippen will be executed on the morning of Nov. 23.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—The steamer Sangorio which arrived last week from Genoa and Naples, and was detained because of two deaths on the voyage among the steerage passengers, believed to be due to cholera, was allowed to dock to-day. The crew will not be permitted to leave the vessel which will sail on its return trip in a few days. All the patients transferred from the steamer on its arrival are doing well.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 21.—Fighting between a dense smoke and blinding flame in a burning oil house on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad to-day, Howard Winkendoff and five others were burned to death. The men had worked all of Sunday, Sparks from a passing engine fired the building and they could be seen running around endeavouring to find the door before they fell. The bodies were buried beyond recognition.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 21.—The Duma adjourned to-day's session out of respect for Count Leo Tolstoy who died at Astapovo yesterday, though the Duma did not pass it off until after a wrangle, some contending that to honour the memory of the Russian Reformer and Novelist would be to challenge the Greek Catholic Church. In proposing the adjournment the President eulogized Tolstoy whom he described as "The pride of Russia and the glory of mankind," adding "Aby the merciful God open to him the Kingdom of Heaven." Many societies and organizations are preparing to send deputations to the funeral.

ELPASO, Texas, Nov. 21.—One hundred persons were killed in the rioting which took place at Zacatecas in the interior of Mexico, opposite Tampico, Saturday night, according to reports received here this morning. Soldiers fired into the struggling body of rioters with disastrous effect; but the lowest estimate of the loss of life which may reach 500. The American Consul telegraphed the first news of the riots to the Mexican Consul at San Antonio, stating that the town was in a state of uproar and that the loss of life was not less than 100. No details were given other than that a company of soldiers were ordered to fire upon a vast crowd of rioters which thronged the streets. Zacatecas is the Capital of the State of Zacatecas in Central Mexico, about 500 miles from the U. S. Line. News of the riots did not reach the outside world until late Sunday, although the battle took place Saturday night. It is stated that quiet has been restored by placing the city under rigid military rule. Latest reports are that the slain are still lying in the streets where they fell.

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
