WASHINGTON, April 19.
In the House of Representatives to-
day, former Speaker Cannon spoke in
opposition to Reciprocity. He said,
in part, that not since the War with
Spain had so important a bill been
considered. On the action of the
House rests the well-being and pros-
perity of the States. It is proper,
with slight consideration, to vitiate
into law an agreement which affected
every home in the land. He declared
that the opening of new Canadian
lands would depreciate American farm
lands. They say that there is no dan-
ger for our wheat from the opening of
our markets to Canada. President
Taft says he will reduce the cost of
living without impairing the farmers'
market. I would like to see, he ad-
ded, how he will not impair farmers'
prices and at the same time reduce the
cost of living.

WASHINGTON, April 19.
After months of negotiations, the
American Government has decided to
rescind the order imposing counter-
vailing duties on British spirits. The
British Government made urgent re-
presentations that distillers of Eng-
lish whiskeys did not receive bounty
within the meaning of the Payne-Ad-
rich law. In reaching their conclu-
sion, the department was influenced
by the fact that Britain has as its
fiscal policy, not only Free Trade, but
also the lack of artificial stimulus to
trade. Imports amounting to several
millions yearly are affected by the
decision.

CAPE TOWN, April 19.
The Portuguese mail steamer, Lusit-
ania, has been wrecked off the Cape
of Good Hope. Eight were drowned.
They are now transferring the eight
hundred passengers.

LONDON, April 19.
The Commons have passed the first
clause of the Veto Bill under closure,
by a vote of 143 to 78. It deals with
the powers of the Lords as to Money
Bills.
