

The Turkish army occupying the eninsula of Gallipoli, in defence of he Dardanelles, suffered defeat at the ands of the Bulgarians, south of the River Kavati, yesterday. The Otto nan troops are said to have retreate disorder toward the town of I of the city of Gallipoli. They were oursued by the Bulgarians. As sult nearly the whole coast of the ser of Marmora, as far as Bulair, is now in the hands of the Allies.

LONDON, Feb. 6.

LONDON, Feb. 6 There is much uncertainty as operations at the front. That the Bulgarians appear to be moving their positions westward along th Tchatalja lines indicates that th fear an attempt to outflank them, bu so far there is no confirmation of the rumor that the Turks are moving troops by the sea to Rodosto and Mid ia. They appear to have met wit reverse near Gallipoli, but it is no known whether or not the main for was engaged. No Naval movemen has been reported. Dr. Daneff ro turned to Sofia to-day. The Ambassa dors had another meeting in London this afternoon.

LONDON, Feb. 6. The Postmaster General has de lined to release the Marconi Conpany from its contract to erect a chain of wireless stations throughout the British Empire. This decision has been taken on advice of the Marconi Parliamentary Inquiry Commission. The Lawson ordeal before the Commission still continues. Yesterday he asked Lord Hugh Cecil who was examining him on the subject of his allegations, as to ministerial interest in the Marconi boom, not to treat him as if he were a prisoner n a police court. Lawson admitted heat in writing his articles. He had written several things that he would ertainly not write again.
