MORGAN'S ASSAILANT WAS IN-STRUCTOR IN GERMAN.

NEW YORK, To-day. The attempt to assassinate J. P. Morgan, financiar, who is the British Govts. financial agent in the United States, was made at Morgan's country estate near Glencove, Long Island, on Saturday morning. Morgan was shot but not dangerously wounded. His assailant said he was F. Holt, of Corneil University, and also of Dallas, Texas. Cornell University records contain the name of Frank Holt. FAILURE IN AMERICA. London, June 29.—Count Albert Ap ponyi, in an interview with the Vien-na correspondent of the Budapest Journal, Pesti-Naplo, after an audi-ence he had with the Emperor, referred to his experiences in the Unite States, saying:
"It was a most painful disappoint

ment for me to see the majority of the American people, among them treas-ured friends of mine and people I came into contract with at the time of my former visits to the States, taking up an attitude so opposed to us. "Through my American connection it was made possible for me to get a hearing in the American press, even in the most notorious anti-German organ, The New York Times, and I used this opportunity to point out to my American friends that they were throwing away the beautiful role they were destined to play, that of acting as peacemakers, by their biased atti-tude. In explanation we have only to say that our information was received from an officer of the police, who had visited the place the after-noon previous. His description of the surroundings was more detailed than the story published by us, and at his request we made a plea on behalf of those women whom we were led to believe were most deserving objects

We trust that the foregoing will satisfactorily explain our position in the matter.
