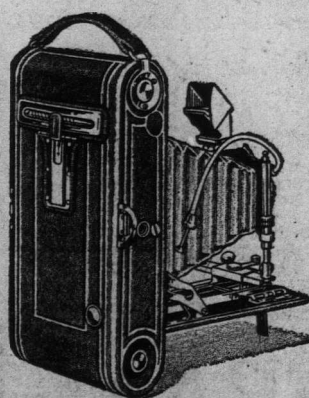

The Municipal Bill

The seventh regular meeting of the
Citizens' Committee took place last
night in the Board of Trade Rooms,
the attendance being fairly large.
The Secretary read the minutes of
the last meeting which were adopted.
Mr. Alex. Mews asked if any reply in
relation to the committee's expendi-
ture had been received from the Pre-
mier. The Chairman's reply was
"No." Mr. Mews suggested that the
bills be certified by the Chairman,
and handed to the Municipal Board
for payment. Mr. Summers was of
the opinion that the committee's ex-
penditure should be shouldered by
the representatives of St. John's East
and West, who called the first meet-
ing of citizens in the T.A. Hall. He
also proposed that the Colonial Sec-
retary be written in relation to the
matter. The Bill was then taken up,
and Section 2 to Section 8 were dis-
cussed. Mr. Kelly objected to allow-
ing landlords to rent basements in
houses as sleeping rooms. Mr. Brad-
ley spoke on the black smoke section,
and proposed that the word "vapour"
be added. Mr. Way, in speaking on
the franchise, proposed that women
over 21 years of age be allowed to
vote. The meeting adjourned at 10.30
to meet again Thursday evening, when
the Section dealing with the right of
corporations and firms to vote will be
considered.
