When Anchors Float. Seaplanes Sometimes Raise Then During Storms.

Did you know that a seaplane takes as big an anchor as a battleship does1 A battleship weighs about three thousand times as much as a seaplane. A five-ton anchor will hold a battleship safe through the heaviest storm. You would expect, then, that a seaplane anchor would be a thing you would carry in your hand. But, startling as it may seem, a seeplane needs a dreadnought anchoran anchor nearly as heavy as itself. The reason is curious but simple. When a storm blows, a ship tries to pull her anchor along the bottom of the sea. The flukes of the anchor catch round some projection and hold fast. It is the grip, not the weight, of a ship's anchor that keeps a ship safe. But a seaplane does not try to drag her anchor at all. She tries to lift it

straight up. Why? Well, for much the same reason that makes your cap or bowler hat fly off when you are out in a gale or travelling in a fast car. You may have noticed that it always flies up a little before falling on the road. It has to, in fact, in order to blow off at all. /

The curved surface of the seaplane's wings correspond to the round top of your hat or cap. And when a powerful current of air is blown horizontally against a curved surface it tends to make that surface rise up into the air. (This is really the secret of all flight, the strong current of air being in ordinary flying provided by the tremendous forward speed given by the engine.)

So when a storm blows, an anchored seaplane rises straight up in the air like a lift, and tries to hoist her anchor up with her. With a seaplane it is the weight of the anchor that counts, not the strength.

Things weigh lighter in water than they do in air. Many a seaplane in a storm has managed to lift her anchor to the surface of the sea without being able to hoist it any higher, and has drifted away down wind like a feather, with her heavy iron anchor "floating" on the surface of the sea.
