## British Shipbuilding.

London. (By Canadian Press.)—Despite the fact that the workers in the shipyards of Great Britain are already unemployed by reason of the impossibility of competing for tonnage under the present cost of production, motor-ship construction last year constituted a record and promises this year to eclipse that record.

According to "Motor Ship," Great Britain led the world in this type of ship construction, her quota of the total number of ships launched or completed in 1921 being 27, compared with 12 for Denmark and 11 for Germany and 24 divided between Sweden, the United States, Holland, Italy, Norway, France, Spain and Portugal. The aggregate tonnage completed was 333,475. In addition, 239,850 tons were launched, but were not completed at the end of last year. These figures are exclusive of any vessels under 1,000 tons deadweight.





## Did "Key Note" Cause Roof to Fall?

Vibration caused by musical instruments, abetted by the weighty snow, is being considered by scientists as a contributing cause for the disastrous collapse of the Knickerbocker Theatre roof, Washington. Slight swayings, which may have been caused by certain notes struck by the orchestra or the huge pipe organ, possibly assisted in making the roof supports insecure, according to several noted scientists and experts upon sound action.

"Although I cannot say what one of the Knickerbocker organ which was in harmony with the vibration of the theatre building," said a member of the Musicians' Union. He stated that he had played the organ in the ill-fated theatre on several occasions, and he recalled the time that the organ used at the St. Louis Exposition was installed in the music hall in the east, and upon the striking of a certain note the skylight was shattered. After an investigation the removal of the large footstaps on the organ was ordered.
