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

LEIPSIC, Germany, April 16 (A.P.) -Monkeys often cry like children, but the man-ape is the only animal which laughs, Dr. Emil Carthaus, zoologist and explorer, has concluded after spending many years in the native haunts of wild game in various parts of the world.

In just one instance, reports Dr Carthaus, he saw and heard a manape or siamang laugh. This was in the midst of an Indian jungle where, from the safety of a steel cage, the zoologist was making his observations.
