### No. 2 Subject - "The Oven"

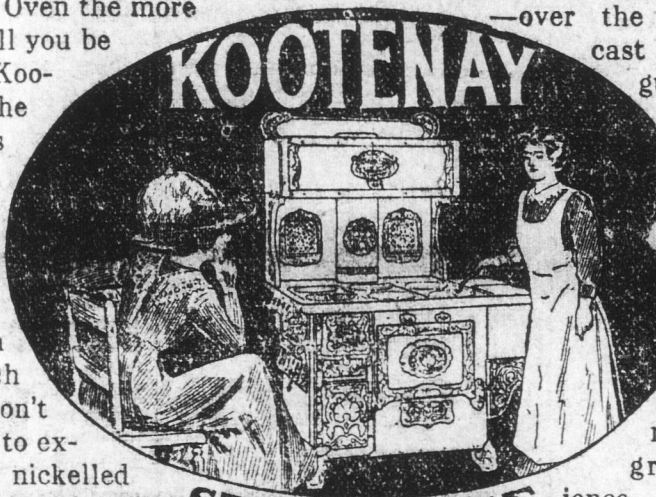
"The reasons for the 'Kootenay's' splendid cooking and baking reputation are very plain—The heat flues are broad and deep—surround the entire Oven so that it

"The thermometer is a great convenience. Plain figures show the exact degree of heat necessary for baking pies, cakes, bread, etc., or roasting meat. No need to open the door—that only cools off the Oven. The thermometer costs a little more, but I wouldn't be without it. Of course there are other splendid features about the 'Kootenay'. ## CONTENDS THAT DIVORCE GRANTED IN RENO IS NOT VALID

California Court Must Unravel Tangled Skein of Divorces and Marriages

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—When a Reno divorce is not a divorce, this new version of an old fiddle is being added to the trials of Mrs. Maryon Andrews Bruguere-Denning, the enchantress of the "Reno divorce" who married to Dr. Edgar Bruguere, the son of the late Earl Bruguere of New York, on December 20, 1902, and divorced from him—well, that's the question.

And it's so mystifying a question that Mrs. Denning, or Bruguere, as she pretends to call herself, yesterday turned the matter over to her attorneys in this city with instructions to prove to the satisfaction of the courts, if possible, that she is still Mrs. Edgar Bruguere—though the doctor has married again—and as such is entitled to a month for her own support, \$100 a month, \$400 for counsel fees, and \$500 a month for the support of her child, 8-year-old Bruguere, Jr.

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## RED, MILLIONAIRE GUNMAN OF TEXAS, AND WIFE ARE RECONCILED

Run an End to the Sordid Story of the Love Affair of Mrs. Sneed, Who Ran Away With Boyce to Canada, and Which Cost Four Lives

Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 2.—John Sneed, the rich Amarillo banker, who shot and killed Albert C. Boyce, father of the man who ran away with his wife, has become reconciled with Mrs. Sneed. Mr. and Mrs. Sneed have left Fort Worth and friends say they have gone to Georgetown, Texas, where Sneed formerly lived, to reside.

This puts an end, at least temporarily, to the story of a broken home which led to the spectacular cross-country chase after the runaway and which ended directly responsible for the deaths of Sneed was tried for murder by the jury failed to agree and let him go. Young Boyce, with whom Mrs. Sneed ran away, is reported to be hiding in Manitoba, Canada.

Last winter, Mrs. Lena Sneed moved from the Arlington Heights Sanatorium here and ran away with Albert C. Boyce, Jr., son of a wealthy ranch owner. They took with them \$10,000 in cash and easily negotiable securities.

Cross Country Chase. Sneed chased the pair across the country, leaving hellboys to get track of the runaways. He finally traced the couple to Winnipeg, Canada, where he overtook Mrs. Sneed and brought her back with him.

The matter created a furore in Texas, as all the principles were persons of wealth and of high standing in society. The elder Boyce sided with his son openly. Sneed was sitting in the Metropolitan Hotel on January 13, 1912, when the elder Boyce came in. A quarrel followed, in which Sneed killed Boyce.

Sneed was indicted for murder and the trial set for February 1. Rumors were rife that both sides were trying to intimidate the witnesses for the opposite side.

E. C. Throckmorton, who was with Sneed, died February 2. Before he died he said he thought he had been the chief witness against "doped."
