The Markets

LOCAL MARKET PRICES

Local market prices, as quoted in the weekly circular of P. Burns & Co. are as follows:

The price on eggs will be 20c per dozen for strictly fresh No. 1 stock delivered in Calgary. This price is for strictly fresh no-wild eggs. Please see that your name and address are plainly marked on all shipments to us. It would assist us materially in making prompt remittances if you would always advise us when making shipments.

Note prices on dairy butter. We prefer to have all butter shipped to us in solid rather than in bricks. Dairy butter—No. 1, 9c; No. 2, 8c; No. 3, 10c; No. 4, 7c. We are paying the following prices on live poultry delivered, Calgary: No. 1 turkeys, after No. 1 chickens, 17c; No. 1 fowls, 12c; No. 1 ducks, 17c; No. 1 geese, 15c. Other grades at proportionate prices. We cannot accept thin cut stock. We can supply shippers with poultry crates at \$1.50 each and on returning same will credit you with this amount, providing they are in good condition.

Live pigeons and squabs, \$2.00 per dozen. Pressed poultry as follows: No. 1 No. 2 No. 3 Turkeys 18c 14c 10c Chicken 13c 9c 6c Doves 12c 8c 5c Geese 16c 11c 8c Thin No. 4 stock not desired.

Dressed poultry: Wing feathers should be pulled on all dressed poultry, heads wrapped to prevent blood on stock, stock not to be tied with string, box to be well lined with clean paper.

Conditions in the Far West and Northwest compare favorably with this time last year, and the outlook is encouraging.

At Winnipeg, country trade is quiet, but sales of lumber and hardware are in normal volume, and provisions and groceries are moving freely.

Saskatoon reports an active demand for fine clothing, shoes and groceries, and good retail sales of hardware.

There is a steady demand for merchandise, particularly groceries and provisions, at Regina, and large railroad expenditures benefit conditions. Retail trade improves at Edmonton, and the wholesale merchants display some conservatism.

A good demand for groceries and provisions is noted at Calgary, but weather interferes with trade. Retail trade is only fair at Vancouver, unfavorable weather and a retarding effect, although there is a fair movement of dry goods and kindred lines.

Victoria reports generally quiet conditions. Gross earnings of all Canadian railroads reporting to date for the first week in May show an increase of 7.9 per cent, as compared with the earnings at the same date last year.

Commercial failures in the Dominion of Canada this week numbered 45, against 29 last week and 218 the same week last year.

LUMBERS ASK MORE GETS THOUSAND FOR SPRINGS THAT WERE FAKE

BRICKLAYERS AND MAY GO ON STRIKE

Most Trades Seeking Advance; Bricklayers Will Not Press Theirs for a Time

Labor circles will, it is expected, be a little more lively at the end of the month. There is to be a general demand for an increase in wages despite the fact that work, especially in the building trades, has been very scarce for the last month or so.

Montréal reports rather quiet conditions in dry goods. At wholesale, cooler weather having checked sorting up business to some extent, while fall orders for heavy fabrics, clothing, furs, etc., are not coming in as freely as expected.

London reports retail trade active, and an increased volume of wholesale business in heavy goods is satisfactory.
