By the proclamation Li Hung Chang is empowered to cede to the Japanese the Island of Formosa and the Peninsula of Liao Tung to the 40th degree of latitude; to sanction the opening of five new commercial ports, including Pekin, and to give Japan the power to open cotton factories and other industries
