

This is the first time the tailors have set a limit to the working day, and the local unions everywhere are preparing for the change. At the present time the journeymen tailors who work for custom tailors must find their own workrooms, and as a result most of the work is flone at the homes of the workmen, or in little rooms rented by four or five men who club together. CATERPILLARS

How a Grey County Man Combatted the Plague.

The tent caterpillar, which is doing so much damage to fruit trees throughout the country, can easily be kept within bounds if a little care and labor are taken at this season of the year, although it would have been much easier had the twigs been removed earlier in the season on which their nests were placed. Mr. J. M. Thurston, of Kimberley, recently gave us his method of aestroying them, which, he says, is very effective, and it also has the merit or being entirely original with him. The worms have a peculiar habit of congregating in bunches or webbs at night on trees upon which they feed fluring the day. Upon the least disturbance they all fall to the ground among the grass and are therefore perpared to mount upward and resume their depredations. This gentleman's method is as follows: The Carpenters' District Council of He has placed a temporary handle on Chicago and Cook County inaugurated an old tin dishpan. At dusk he goes a Saturday half-holiday campaign last to the orchard, having provided himself with paper saturated in coal oil. Placing a piece of this paper in the pan he sets fire to it and holds it under the web of worms. As soon as the warmth is felt the caterpillars drop, as usual, but find a hot recep-tion awaiting them. By this method, he says, an orchard can be cleared in short order .- Flesherton, Grey county, Advance.

He gave so harrowing a description of the denizens of the courts and alleys of the parish to a local journalist that those whom he freely described as hawkers and rogues resented his description of them by breaking his windows.
