WILLIAM IN WAR PAINT. Berlin, Nov. 8.-Emperor William yesterday enjoyed one of those military displays which have become remarkable of recent years from the fact that he takes advantage of such occasions to make some utterance which is commented upon for a long time atterwards. He did not fail to do so yesterday, and although there was nothing astonishing in his address, it contained a sharp reference to socialism. The cause of the military turnout was the swearing in of the recruits of the regiments of the guard, which was accompanied by the usual ceremony. His Majesty made a short speech to the young soldiers, reminding them that they now belonged to his army, and bidding them especially to be mindful of the honor which was theirs in being attached to the guard. He added: "Before all things you should trust to God to preserve your own honor and be faithful to your Emperor and country, whether against foreign or an internal foe." Gen. Von Winterfeldt then called for cheers for the Emperor, which were heartily given by all present, and the ceremony of administering the oath of alleglance to the young soldiers just joining the

Edinburgh, Nov. 8.—The United States ambassador, the Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, delivered the inaugural address last evening to the Philosophical Society It was entitled: "Individual Liberty the Germ of National Progress and Permanence." The paper read by the American ambassador was a scholarly and patriotic docu-ment, upon which Mr. Bayard had evidently devoted much labor. The most striking passages were those in which he denounced socialism and protection. During the course of his remarks he said: "The deep movement will not rest in the breasts of men. The weight of armed repression and the upheavals of popular discontent are plainly discernable. While in some countries the consolidation of the empire progresses remarkably, in others its disentegration is equally significant. The old dynasties are drifting hope-lessly or sinking palpably." After al-luding to the preparations for war on land and sea—which, he asserted, were never so formidable as today; to the increasing burdens of militarism, and to the hostile attitude assumed towards each other of capital and labor, Mr. Bayard remarked: "The movement of today is toward State Socialism as an opposing force to autocracy, either of which is despotism." The American ambassador then dwelt at length on the theme of his address, saying that however society is framed, it is by per-sonal characteristics and individual qualities that its affairs in the end must be decided. He continued: "We are witnessing the decline and fall of once mighty empires, as the result of despotic government and the destruc-

Two Hundred Policemen Overcome by Five Thousand Women

The Police Had to Use Force-How the Inspector Gained One Victory.

New York, Nov. 8.-Neither the love of the world for a lover nor the curlosity of the people concerning the wealthy nor yet that lurking weakness in the American heart for folks of title can account satisfactorily for the walks of Fifth avenue for three blocks in both directions from St. Thomas' Church, in which Miss Vanderbilt and the Duke of Mariborough were married

TWO HUNDRED POLICEMEN THERE. As nearly as one could estimate it from 6,000 to 7,000 people were gathered between Fiftieth and Fifty-sixth streets. Of these 5,000 were women. To keep the space in front of the church clear and to hold the crowd within decent bounds Acting Inspector Cortright had 200 men to help And he needed them, and could have made advantageous use of 500 more. "I won't! I've got a perfect right here. You don't own the sidewalks of this city," was the snappy retort. "I don't claim to own the sidewalks," answered the acting inspector with perfect courtesy. "But don't you think it would be rather unfair if we allowed you to stand here and drive the others away?"
