He Strongly Disapproves the Personal Property Provisions.

Address Before the Board of Trade-Ontario Manufacturers at a Disadvantage, He Claims-Mr. Mur-

dech on Colonial Trade.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade last night Mr. Alex. W. Murdoch, of Murdoch, Barber & Co., Toronto, addressed the members on the subject of colonial trade, in which, he contended, there were tremendous possibilities. The delegates of the Colonial Conference here have been shown specimens of Canadian manufactures and admitted that there was a large opening for them in their countries. A system of bureaus was being established in the colonies where samples of Canadian goods would be placed and trade tested. The manufacturers of Galt and Cornwall were even now combining to send an experimental shipment to the colonies. The intercolonial banking facilities, said Mr. Murdoch, were perfect. The C. P. R. were already offering rates, and other roads would do the same. He pointed out the remarkable expansion of commerce in Cape Colony, where the volume of trade had increased in five years from £3,000,000 to £9,000,000. They had two agents from Toronto located at Cape Town. A line of steamers to this colony from Canada would be subsidized when Parliament opened. As to Australia the C. P. R. were willing, if they thought trade would warrant it, to put on a dozen more steamers. They had to refuse freight now.

Mr. McClary - How do freight rates from New York compare with those via

Vancouver. Mr. Murdoch admitted that they were against Ontario, but if sufficient influence were brought to bear on the Canadian Government to put on further steamers, then the Canadian railroads would find it to their interests to reduce the rates. Mr. Murdoch was thanked by the board.

MR. M'CLARY ON ASSESSMENTS. Mr. John McClary made an address i which he strongly disapproved of the pro visions of the Ontario Assessment Act with respect to personal property. The manufacturer of Ontario with a tax of 40 per cent on the earning power of money could not compete with his rival in Montreal, where capital was exempt. There was \$7,000,000 in the savings banks of London. Two per cent tax on that would produce \$140,000. If that tax were applied would the money remain there? No. Even a tax of $\frac{1}{8}$ per cent — \$8,750 — would drive half of it out. The earning power of this \$7,000,000 at 4 per cent would be \$280,000. Two per cent of this would yield \$5,600, which was the most it would stand without disturbing it. The income tax in England was a penny in the pound. At this rate \$7,000,000 would yield \$1,150. No manufacturer could succeed and pay 40 per cent of its earnings in assessment to the corporation. There was no Province outside of Ontario where a manufacturer was taxed 2 per cent on his capital. Quebec's law was a reasonable one; there was no personal property tax, but merchants paid a tax of 71 per cent on the rental. The most that active capital could stand was an ALL RESERVED SEATS,.....250 assessment on its income. Mr. McClary referred to the time. asked the City Council to limit their assessment to \$100,000 while the company would increase their capital to \$500,000. The council got more taxation by this and the proposition was satisfactory. He (Mr. McClary) then looked forward to a change in the Ontario law, but it did not come. The company two years before the expiry of this period asked a continuance of that fixed assessment for ten more years. Mr. McClary then read an extract from the annual report of the McClary Company up to January, 1893, to show what the company

contempleted doing in case their petition was refused. It concluded thus: "An assessment of 2 per cent on the capital would as effectually drive it from the Province as the same law applied to capital invested in banking and loan societies, whose average earnings are much larger than money invested in manufacturing. Fully understanding our position, should the City Council refuse to carry out the undertaking of the former council, we look on it as absolutely necessary to take such steps as will enable us to remove our head office from this Province to the Province of Quebec, and endeavor to dispose of our plant here on the best possible terms, anticipating a large loss on the plant. Failing this, to promote a limited company with a small capital, with a view to purchasing the plant in this city, while our present company would be used more largely as a purchasing and mercantile than a manufacturing company. This appears to us the most reasonable solution of the problem, should the council fail to carry out its former reasonable under-

The board considered the subject one of great importance, and may discuss it fully at a special meeting. In the meantime the secretary will ask the opinions of other boards, notably Toronto, with a view to united action. Some unimportant business was trans-
