The drought continues in Manitoba, but it is more than probable that thunderstorms will occur pretty generally in that province during Friday night and Saturday. VISITED THE NORMAL SCHOOL

Members of the Board of Education the Guests of Principal Merchant—Trustees Delighted With the Completeness of the Institution.

A number of the members of the board of education visited the Normal School last night on invitation of Principal Merchant, and were given the opportunity of viewing in its completeness the beautiful building which will make London a still more important factor as an educational center. Among those present were Principal Merchant, Vice-Principal Dearness, ex-Chairman MacRobert, Logan, Blackwell and John Stevenson, Trustees Hamilton, Jones, Wilkins, Macpherson, Evans and Ziegler, and Inspector Carson.

The party were first conducted through the building and all were enthusiastic in their admiration of its beauty and completeness. The well-appointed lecture rooms, the lofty assembly room, the sanitary arrangements, the heating system and the automatic heat regulating appliance were in turn viewed with interest and admiration. Luncheon was served in the secretary's office, and those present gave abundant evidence of their appreciation of the visit.

When luncheon had been disposed of, the gathering repaired to the principal's office. After informal conversation, Trustee Macpherson rose and expressed his personal pleasure and the pleasure of his fellow-trustees in being present and partaking of Principal

Merchant's hospitality. He moved a vote of thanks to the principal. This Ex-Chairman MacRobert seconded, at the same time voicing the esteem and appreciation which Mr. Merchant had won from the board while principal of the Collegiate Institute. All the ex-chairmen and trustees present followed, paying high tributes to Mr. Merchant's personal worth and his work as an educationalist, and also speaking highly of the ability of his assistant, Vice-Principal Dearness. The principal and vice-principal replied in neat speeches, thanking the speakers for their expressions of regard, and briefly outlining their hopes and aims for the future of the school. Inspector Carson also spoke briefly in reference to the intimate relations existing between the Normal School and Model School staffs. The singing of the National Anthem brought the evening to a close.

HOWAY GUILTY

Will Be Sentenced, if a Reserve Case Is Not Granted—Geo. Corrigan Also Convicted.

The jury in the case of Arthur Howay, accused of throwing a missile at a street car last summer, remained out for over two hours yesterday afternoon, and then returned with a verdict of guilty. Howay was remanded for sentence. Mr. McEvoy, the prisoner's counsel, applied for a reserve case, on the ground that certain evidence should not have been admitted. Judge Elliott will give his decision on the application before the court closes. Should the reserve case be granted, the judge may allow the prisoner out on bail while the court of appeal decides upon his application, but if the judge refuses the reserve case then application must be made to the attorney-general's department. Only one witness was called in the

case against George Corrigan, the tramp, accused of stopping a G. T. R. express by giving a false signal. Engineer Crouch testified to Corrigan as the man who had flagged the train. Corrigan had no counsel, and as he did not enter the box himself the jury returned a verdict of guilty without leaving the room. The prisoner was remanded for sentence. He is evidently of unsound mind.
