

NOT GOOD FOOD FOR THE FISHES

Sewage Should Not Be Emptied Into the River—No Need to Spare the Quail.

The local branch of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association held a well-attended meeting last night in the Albion block. Much important business was dealt with, and many important and instructive speeches were delivered.

Mr. W. D. Fraser addressed the members about a motion which was recently made in Parliament to allow the shooting of quail until after the year 1915. Mr. Fraser spoke strongly against any such measure, which, he pointed out, would be unnecessary, as of late quail have been becoming quite plentiful. He introduced a resolution to the effect that the society was not in favor of any such bill, believing that any alteration being made in the present law regarding the shooting of quail.

Mr. William Brock seconded the motion, and made a short and appropriate speech, expressing his views of the situation. He pointed out that last fall quail were exceptionally plentiful.

Dr. J. D. Wilson spoke about the fishing in the Thames, and suggested that some steps should be taken to prevent the city sewage from being dumped into the river, and also the sewage from other towns on the river, as the water is rendered impure by such refuse.

Mr. Wm. Brock also spoke against the dumping of the city sewage into the Thames, and pointed out that the present sewage beds are not being put to use as they should be.

A resolution was passed to have posters, warning that netting, spearing and other illegal practices, are punishable, printed and put up in all places under the jurisdiction of the association. The posters would also be calculated to encourage the farmers in the district to take advantage of the opportunities afforded them.

It is expected that since there are to be no nets on the Thames, the pike and pickerel will come up the river, as soon as the spring freshets come, and it has been stated that the Byron and Springbank dams are not properly supplied with good fish ladders to allow the fish to go up past them.

A committee composed of Messrs. Nugent, Noble, Vincent, Best, Peacock and Brock, was appointed to investigate the matter.

Several new members entered and paid their fees. Several other speakers were heard. All commended the action of the Government in stopping the net fishing on the Thames, and exhorted the society to do all possible to prevent the return of the net fishing after the two years is up.

ADMITTED STEALING GRAIN

Seymour Karn Confesses to Serious Offense—Sentence Deferred.

Seymour Karn, who was arrested a few days ago and committed for trial on a charge of having stolen 23 bushels of wheat and 16 bags of grain from Joseph Cassidy, a Byron farmer, appeared before Judge Elliott this morning and pleaded guilty to the charges. E. W. M. Flock appeared on behalf of the prisoner, and asked that sentence be deferred for a day or two in order that he might be given an opportunity to produce evidence of Karn's previous good character, and evidence showing that he was led into the commission of the crime of which he is charged by the influence of two colleagues who as yet have not been apprehended.

"Karn," said Mr. Flock, "has been out of employment for some time, temptation was laid in his way and he fell."

"What about his partners in the theft?" asked his honor. "Has Karn given their names to the authorities yet?"

"As to that I couldn't say," replied the attorney. "I haven't talked with the prisoner on the subject at all. I can say, though, that any sentence which your honor may inflict upon the prisoner will reflect more upon his family than himself. He is the sole support of his wife and a young niece."

Mr. Flock then submitted a letter from a former employer of Karn's, which spoke highly of his previous character.

Sentence was deferred until Saturday morning.

THE POOR ARE WITH US STILL

Heavy Draft on Funds of the Charity Society During This Winter.

The Charity Organization and Humane Society held a well-attended meeting in the city hall this morning. Miss Graydon, vice-president, occupied the chair.

The secretary's report was, as usual, an evidence of the good work this little society is doing among the less fortunate members of the community, and the number of cases of poverty and distress with which the secretary has dealt during the past month shows the necessity for its operations. This winter the society's funds have been called upon to a greater extent than ever before to relieve the wants of the poor and needy. There have not been so many applicants for work as in former years, but there are a great many cases where the wage-earners have been incapacitated in some way, thus bringing want and hardship to themselves and those dependent on them for support.

There are also a number of immigrant families who were totally unprepared for the rigor of our Canadian winter, and who have had to be assisted. Then again there is a great deal of sickness among the poorer classes in the city, which has occasioned much distress. Many families have been visited by the secretary and the lady members of the board, and the society is therefore fully acquainted with the actual conditions existing in these homes. Not only does the board give material assistance in these cases, but it seeks to place the families with whom it deals on a higher and more independent footing, where the need of such assistance will cease to exist.

Another object of the society is to put down all imposition on the charity-disposed people of the city. A well-dressed man has recently been seen about the city selling collar buttons, and telling a story to the effect that he is in the first stages of consumption and trying to work his way to Gravenhurst. The man also said that he was a citizen of St. Thomas, and had a wife and family to support. The citizens of that place had subscribed \$25 to help him get to Gravenhurst. A letter written by the secretary's secretary to the relief officer of St. Thomas brought a reply stating that he knew of no such a family, and that St. Thomas was not a member of the Gravenhurst Sanatorium. If on examination the man was found to be affected with tuberculosis, and not too far advanced in the disease, he could have applied to have been sent there, and would not need to have paid anything.

The society wishes to warn citizens against giving money to anyone calling at their doors about the truth of whose story they know absolutely nothing, as in nearly every instance they are impostors.
