The object is to secure to injured workmen an income during their enforced idleness and financial relief for their families in the event of the injuries proving fatal. In case of accident to an employe financial liability is attached to the employer. When an injury results in total or partial disability the employer must pay to the injured each week, after the lapse of two weeks, 50 per cent of his average power. Ontario wants a lot of Niagara wage, and if the injury results fatally the employer is required to pay to the defendants a sum equal to the earnings of the deceased in that employment during the three previous years, but not to exceed \$1,500. Where there are no dependents the employer escapes with the payment of \$100 for medical attendance and the expenses of the funeral. The act does not relieve the employer from liability to a civil action for damages, if he can be proved responsible, but if the employe is to blame the employer is only liable in the event of death ensuing, when the defendants must receive compensation. The result of this legislation will be to cause employers to seek the protection of liability insurance comparies, as is done in this and other inces. ARE VERY GREAT

Bernard Mallet Estimates It To Be About Thirty Billions of Dollars.

London, Feb. 26 .- How shall the wealth of the country be computed? That is a problem of first importance, especially in a nation where the burden of taxation is enormous and the Government is constantly seeking for new sources of revenue.

No reputable economist has heretofore attempted to solve it on any basis commanding greater respect than shrewd guess work, and estimates put forward, in England have ranged over a wider divergence than 100 per cent. One estimator puts England's wealth about \$30,500,000,000. Most of the calculations have been based on the capital represented in the payment of death duties year by

The question then arises what multiplier should be used on the capital paying death duties in an average year in order to ascertain the total wealth of the nation. The authorities have varied in this respect all the way from 24 per cent to 55 per cent, with the result that the British assets are calculated all the way from \$31,500,-
