London, Nov. 30. — In the sedate, detached manner characteristic of the preceedings in the gilded chamber, and in direct disregard of the advice of some of its abjest and oldest members, such as Rosebery, Morley, Lord James of Hereford, Lord Cromer, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, the Earl of Lytton, Lord Courtney and the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, the House of Lords today created a situation unprecedented in English history, at least in three hundred years, by refusing formal assent to the burget and referring it to the country itself for judgment, therefore, in theory, making it illegal to collect taxes and carry on the King's Government. The vote Six Days' Debate.

After six days' debate, noted for the able and convincing arguments ar rayed on both sides for and against the budget, and placing in every pos sible light all the aspects of the great constitutional questions involved, the House of Lords cleared for division at 11:30 o'clock tonight. Many Strange Faces Present.

The scene was impressive, but in no sense exciting, except that the House was packed, and a great array of strange faces were seen on the benches, owing to the presence of numbers of peers who only appear in the House

None would have supposed that the event proceeding was destined not only to prove memorable in the annals of British history, but possibly also involving far-reaching changes in the British constitution.


