The street railway will bring nen from Montreal and other points and make an effort to give the regular service. This may precipitate trouble and lead to a state of riot.

Threat Made by Murderer Against Judge Street is Remembered.

The escape of W. A. Moir, the London murderer from the Hamilton Asylum for the Criminally Insane, is the chief topic of conversation around the city today and many men who knew the soldier for years are of the opinion that Moir is as same as the majority of people who know enough to keep out of trouble.

A young Englishman employed as a street railway conductor, told The Advertiser that he had known Moir for Mr. Malloch was 55 years old and years and that he never knew that he suffered from epilepsy until his trial for the murder of Col.-Sergt. Lloyd in

Moir a Sane Man.

"I have had the boxing gloves on with Moir many a time and such strenuous work would surely show on a man if he were subject to the disease. He had a violent temper and iquor was his chief trouble. The authorities believe that Moir

knows he has the police at a disadvantage in a fight, as he has been declared insane and could shoot to kill without making his predicament any worse, as he cannot be hanged, and the maximum penalty has been imposed for the murder of Lloyd. If he succeeds in making his escape by Killing someone else he is no worse off, and it is thought that this would not worry him very greatly after his experience

Nearly Eight Thousand Vessels With a Tonnage of 738,533.

Ottawa, Aug. 16.-The merchants marine of Canada at the close of the fiscal year, consisted of 7.768 vessels with 738,533 aggregate tennage, an increase during the year of 166 vessels of 16,228 tons. At the close of the
