In fact, ten minutes after they stopped boxing, the sparring partner's face was so sore that they had to call a doctor. Of course, the dope might not have the same effect on you, but at the same time, I advise you to be careful, and at the ringside insist on having Jeff fight with new gloves, then let your seconds watch his seconds to see that they don't put any of the liquid on the gloves during the course of the fight, or switch back to any old gloves.

From now on until the day before the big scrap, Jack Johnson will train for speed only, and to keep himself on edge. The champion announced this morning that he is perfectly satisfied with his condition; that he is down as low in weight as he desires, 212 pounds, and that from now on boxing would fill up the major part of his routine. Since beginning training Johnson has boxed on no specific days. He has

donned the gloves when he felt like it, and refused to put them on when he did not feel like it. From now on all this will be changed. At least four days of boxing per week will be the schedule, and possibly six days will be indulged in by the black man.

CLOSING STAGES.

Johnson is beginning the last stages of the training spell. There will be no jumping over the ropes or joy-riding for Johnson. He will be made to realize that he has a man's job on his hands, and that the slightest slip may not only cost him the championship, but a fortune of wealth. The big dark racing car of Johnson's has been relegated to a paint shop, where it will be revarnished and fixed over for various speed stunts after the big row. It nearly broke Johnson's heart to part with the machine, and he moped for several hours after it had been taken away, but finally recovered his spirits, and he grinned broadly when he was told that he would have all the chance in the world to break speed records and his neck after the scrap. and his neck after the scrap. COME EAST AT ONCE.

"Might be some records busted, but dere ain't gwine ter be no necks twisted," he declared.
