DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY

(Continued From Page One.)

[Associated Press.]

Washington, Nov. 9.—The Democrats are rejoicing in the landslide which gives them the first victory they have had since 1892. The east went very strongly Democratic, while the Republicans more than held their ground in the west. Roosevelt's candidates were defeated in practically every place he spoke, Democratic errors were elected in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Ohio.

The importance of the elections lay not only in the trial of strength between the contending parties, but in the vital bearing they would have on the next Presidential contest, and in the spectacular attempt of Roosevelt to re-establish his position as the dominating figure in American politics. The real issue, indeed, was Rooseveltism, and instead of the personal triumph which a Republican victory would have signified, the ex-President has met with ignominious defeat. The Democrats claim that the tariff and the high cost of living played an important part in the campaign.

New York State and Ohio were two of the principal storm-centres in the gubernatorial contests, and both have delivered staggering blows to Roosevelt. Dix defeating Stimson by a plurality estimated at from 50,000 to 60,000, while Harmon has carried the Democratic colors to victory in President Taft's home state. The latter's success may mean his selection as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency in 1912. A triumph for the cause of clean government is the election of Woodrow Wilson, the former president of Princeton University, as governor of the state of New Jersey, and other significant Democratic victories are those of Foss in Massachusetts and Baldwin in Connecticut.

Among the notable results are the re-election of Speaker Cannon in Illinois, and the defeat of Parsons, one of Roosevelt's right-hand men, in the thirteenth New York district, and of Grilik in Iowa, to speak for whom the ex-President interrupted his New York campaign. Though "Uncle Joe" has come back, the Republicans will have saved the delicate task of appointing a new Speaker.

Democratic Sweep.—The Democrats carried Geneva, Hornell, Niagara Falls, Poughkeepsie, El-

mira, and many other cities of the third classes.

The Hearst vote in the state was also surprisingly small. In many of the former Hearst strongholds Hopper, candidate for governor, on the Hearst ticket, ran ahead of Hearst, who was candidate for lieutenant-governor. In Greater New York the Hearst vote does not exceed 40,000. Returns from Greater New York districts show plainly that the Hearst strength was directed in an effort to elect Stimson. In Kentucky, Caleb Powers, thrice convicted for the assassination of Goebel, and not long out of prison, was elected to Congress by 3,000, carrying every county in his district except his home county of Laurel.

Incomplete returns from Kansas indicate the defeat of Governor Stubbs and insurgent Republicans in the second, fifth and sixth districts. Chairman Martin, of the Democratic state committee, claims the election of Hodges, Democrat for governor, and three and possibly four candidates for Congress.

Speaker Elected.—Uncle Joe Cannon, Speaker of the House, is elected by the biggest majority the district has given for ten years. Sereno Payne, chairman of the ways and means committee, is elected by a plurality, but little short of normal. John Dalzell, another of Speaker Cannon's lieutenants, is re-elected in Pennsylvania. J. Sloat Fassett, a supporter of Speaker Cannon, but one of the old guard upholders of Roosevelt at Saratoga, is defeated.

Clark's View.—Bowling Green, Mo., Nov. 9.—Champ Clark, minority leader in the House of Representatives, when advised that the Democrats would control the next House of Representatives said: "The landslide is attributable directly to the tariff and the fight on the rules in the House. Hearst's Statement.—New York, Nov. 9.—William R. Hearst issued this statement today. "The voters of the country have repudiated the Republican party, and undoubtedly the Republican party has amply merited the rebuke it has received. "The voters have turned to the Democratic party, and the serious question now to be determined is whether the Democratic party will deserve the confidence of the citizens, and will do more to remedy the conditions of which the people complain than the Republican party has done. "For my part, I sincerely hope that the Democratic party will fully realize

the expectations of its supporters and fully respond to the requirements of the citizens."

Wanted Hopper.—"I supported the Democratic party in many states. But in this state I carried the vote, and I was elected as Hopper. I believed him to be the most genuine Democrat in the field for governor."

As for Mr. Roosevelt he came home from his parade abroad just in time to give the tottering Republican edifice one final push, and to be buried in its ruins. "I am not disposed to mourn for Mr. Roosevelt. As a matter of fact, I am thoroughly delighted that the United States, like Portugal, has decided to be a republic, and depose and elect this royal pretender."

Harmon Elected.—Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 9.—The Democrats yesterday swept Ohio, and in addition to electing Judson Harmon for a second term as governor, have undoubtedly elected the remainder of their state ticket, and a majority of the Legislature. In consequence, Senator Charles Dick, Republican, will be succeeded in 1911 by a Democrat.

Harmon's plurality over Warren G. Harding, Republican, is still in doubt this morning, but sufficient returns are in to show that it is the largest ever given by a small majority. The latest estimates give Harmon a margin of 60,000 over Harding. The next Ohio congressional delegation will contain 13, and possibly, 15 Democrats, out of the 21.

Beveridge Wins.—Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 9.—That late returns from yesterday's election changed the drifts that Republicans were assured of a small majority in the Legislature, and that United States Senator Beveridge would be elected, was the claim of Chairman Lee, of the Republican state committee, at 5 o'clock this morning. Senator Beveridge said he believed he had defeated John W. Kern, Democrat, by a small margin.

Washington Firm.—Seattle, Nov. 9.—The Republicans of Washington won a sweeping victory in yesterday's election, choosing five of the state's eight members of Congress, William E. Humphries, Stanton Warburton and Wm. L. LaFollette. The Republican majority in the Legislature will be more than 100, insuring the election of Miles Poinsett as United States senator. A woman suffrage amendment to the state constitution seems to have been carried by a majority of two to one.

Utah Republican.—Salt Lake City, Utah, Nov. 9.—Utah has re-elected Joseph Howell, Republican, to Congress, and rejected state-wide prohibition as demanded by the Democratic platform.

Nothing to Say.—Washington, Nov. 9.—President Taft arrived at 8:45 a.m. from Cincinnati, where he voted yesterday, and went direct to the White House. It was announced that he had no statement to make regarding the results of yesterday's election.

Massachusetts' response to the Rooseveltian campaign for Governor Draper and Senator Lodge was the election of Congressman Foss, Democrat, by a plurality in excess of 20,000. Connecticut made the same answer by electing Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, Democrat, by a small plurality, although the Republican state chairman refuses to concede Baldwin's defeat.

In Ohio, where Col. Roosevelt wound up the campaign for the Republicans, Governor Judson E. Harmon was easily re-elected. The Democrats also carried New Jersey, electing Woodrow Wilson, former president of Princeton University, by a handsome plurality, though Col. Roosevelt did not actively oppose him.

In Nebraska.—In Nebraska, where, as in Indiana, the United States senators are practically by popular vote, Hitchcock, anti-Bryan Democrat, is elected over United States Senator Burkett, Republican, by 20,000. Mayor Dahlman, of Omaha, who led the Democratic revolt against Bryan in Nebraska, carried the city of Omaha in his campaign for governor by 8,000. overwhelmingly defeated in that state is Herbert Parsons, son of John E. Parsons, of the sugar trust. Henry George, son of the theorist and single tax advocate, apparently has a small majority over Wm. S. Bennett.

Vote Fell Off.—In New York the surprising feature of the election was that the Republican vote fell off more heavily up-state than it did in Greater New York. In Greater New York the Democratic plurality was considerably exceeded in the year when the state against former Governor O'Dell. The up-state Republicans have seldom, if ever, come down with such a small majority, it being estimated that Stimson, Republican candidate for governor, has no more than 45,000 plurality in the up-state counties.

A feature of the election up-state was that the Democrats carried the small cities and industrial centres, in which the Republicans concentrated themselves in an appeal to the labor vote.

Election Echoes.—President Taft voted in Cincinnati at 11:37. Buffalo gave 4,300 majority for Dix.

Congressman Nicholas Longworth, Roosevelt's son-in-law, is re-elected on the Republican ticket in the first Ohio district.

The Democrats carried Geneva, Hornell, Niagara Falls, Poughkeepsie, Elmira and many other cities in New York State.

In Kentucky, Caleb Powers, thrice convicted for the assassination of Goebel and not long out of prison, was elected to Congress by 3,000, carrying every county in his district except his home county.

Henry L. Stimson, defeated Republican candidate in New York State, sent the following telegram to John A. Dix: "The present campaign has been your election. I congratulate you and send you my good wishes for the success of your administration."

For the first time in history, the Democrats have carried Asbury Park, the great Methodist resort on the New Jersey coast.

Speaker Cannon's manager says he has been elected by the sober common sense of good citizenship. The door has been opened for reform retrenchment and honest administration. As governor I shall adhere to the strict performance of the pledges of the party platform."

Kern Voted.—Oyster Bay, Nov. 8.—Col. Roosevelt voted at noon and his son Kermit cast his first vote. Col. Roosevelt refused to receive the returns at his home tonight, although he talked with Republican state headquarters on the phone.

President Taft.—Cincinnati, Nov. 8.—President Taft voted at 11:37 and then sent a telegram to Harding, Republican candidate for governor, wishing him well. The President received a telegram from Washington, saying that his new cow, Pauline, had given birth to a male calf, weighing 100 pounds, at 5 o'clock this morning.

PHILADELPHIA CAR MEN WON'T STRIKE

Arbitrators Reach an Agreement Satisfactory to Union Leaders.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 8.—A threatened strike of the union motormen and conductors of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company was averted late Tuesday afternoon, when arbitrators who had been trying to adjust an issue raised by the last strike early in the present year came to a compromise agreement.

The arbitrators, Raymond Roberts, of Chicago, representing the men, and John Vogeler, of this city, the company's representative, have eliminated professional strike-breakers employed during the last strike, and who are still with the company as loyal employees. They have also ruled that men who did not go out on strike and those employed at the regular rate of wages of 22 cents an hour during the trouble shall be given preference runs over the men who quit work. No provision is made by the arbitrators for the men hired during the strike at bonus wages.

The award of the arbitrators will be accepted by the company and probably will be ratified by the employees in mass meeting. The leaders of the union express satisfaction with the decision.

CHAMBERLAIN MADE A TRADE SPEECH

Declares There Is Ample Room For Business That Is Mutually Beneficial.

CORONATION DISPLAY

King Will Follow Precedent, But Will Not Try to Outdo Others.

London, Nov. 8.—Austen Chamberlain, speaking at Wigan, said: "Our first duty is to develop and strengthen the particular industries and commonwealths to which we ourselves belong, but when that is done there is ample room for trade, which shall be mutually beneficial, which shall be an exchange between kinsmen from which both will derive advantage, which shall be a fruitful and profitable transaction, which both at the beginning and at the end will strengthen the British and the dominions under the British crown. (Cheers.) Are you going to turn your backs on the finest over ever nation had? Are you going to refuse preferential access to the best markets that ever a manufacturing community has found in which to dispose of its goods?"

Mr. Chamberlain denied absolutely that the tax of two shillings on foreign corn increased the price of the loaf. Concluding, he declared that in the policy he had tried to explain "there is no sacrifice involved, no such demand is made upon you, any more than upon our colonial kinsmen, and you may find, as they have found, that your greatest prosperity, your richest development, is in the mutual advance of the whole British realm." (Prolonged cheers.)

At the Coronation.—London, Nov. 8.—At the coronation on June 22 it is understood that as to the procedure of the ceremony the King will adhere to precedent. There will be no disposition to excel in any of the historic characteristics by adding courtly or military displays. The only possible alteration to the programme will arise from any speciality expressed desiring from the overseas dominions to be more comprehensively represented.

O'Brien on O'Connor.—London, Nov. 8.—William O'Brien, interviewee said that T. P. O'Connor, having been on Canadian ground, and being above all things, a faithful English Liberal, has hitherto stuck consistently to his instructions from the Liberal whip, but he says O'Connor does not greatly count, and will be either repudiated or will repudiate himself at the word of command.

Leave to Appeal Granted.—London, Nov. 8.—In the case of the G. T. R. vs. the land-owners fronting on Empire avenue, McMiller and Hardisty streets, Fort William, leave has been granted to appeal.
