The matter of the guarantee for Messrs. Ellwood, Tambling and Carothers was referred to the water commissioners to look after.

Editor the City Hall.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: At next Monday's council meeting the fate of our old historic city hall will be decided.

It is to be hoped that the city fathers will carefully consider the matter from all standpoints before finally deciding to sell.

If the hall is sold, the bank will extend the building, and as the present building runs only about 80 feet back, this will mean that at least 30 feet by 110 feet of the present Market Square will be taken from the people.

Then again, if the new hall should be built, as proposed, on the Market Square, more of the already crowded market space will be taken away, and London's market, which has been her place, will become so congested that trade would be greatly hampered.

If, however, the new hall were built upon some other site, the cost of this money would take so much of the money that is available, that before the new hall was completed, the citizens would have to vote more money, and the tax rate would rise a mill or two.

It would be hard to choose a site that would please all the citizens. The East Enders want it to go east, the North Enders want the "V" site, while the west and south would prefer the courthouse site.
