DISPUTES ACT HAS PROVED A SUCCESS

Of 124 Cases a Strike Was Prevented in All But Fourteen.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 29. — The annual report of the department of labor notes an upward tendency in wages, attended by an increase in the cost of living. The success of the industrial disputes act is indicated in the fact that in five years 124 disputes in which it was invoked have arisen, and only in 14 did the conciliators fail to prevent a strike.

Last year there were 97 industrial disputes, as against 94 in the year previous. Building trades predominated in these disputes. The report explains and reviews at length the work of the department, an important feature of which is the regular investigation and reports of wholesale prices in relation to the cost of living.

ACTION IS BROUGHT AGAINST AUTO OWNER

Dr. L. Sealé Holmes, of East London, Sues Mr. Frank E. Osborne, of This City.

Messrs. Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons, acting on behalf of Dr. L. Sealé Holmes, have issued writ against Frank E. Osborne, of this city, claiming \$500 damages for injuries to the person and property of the plaintiff through the alleged negligent driving of an automobile by the defendant. About six weeks ago the plaintiff was riding a bicycle on Maitland street, near the corner of Dundas, when he was struck by the defendant's automobile and sustained painful injuries, as well as having his bicycle damaged. The accident, the plaintiff claims, was due to the driver of the automobile taking a wide turn at the corner and encroaching on the left-hand side of the street.

CANADIAN FROGS' LEGS A BROADWAY TIT-BIT

More Palatable Than Chicken or Young Turkey, Says a Noted Chef.

New York, Nov. 29.—According to the Herald, Wall street speculators, in the last two or three weeks, have become enamored with the latest tit-bit, Canadian frogs' legs. These succulent morsels have been sent down from the Canadian lakes of clear spring water.

Frogs' legs, as served in Broadway hotels heretofore, have originated in marshes or muddy streams. As a rule these have not satisfied the palates of the epicures of the financial district.

Several members of the New York stock exchange, who have summered in the Canadian woods, prevailed on their friends to listen to their experience, however. As a result, the Canadian frogs' legs have made their appearance in the cafes of the financial district.

The Wall street discoverers of this delicacy assert that the frogs that provide this palatable morsel are to be found especially in the environs of Quebec. It is asserted that the reason they have never before been made appeal to palates of New York men is that the French-Canadian guides, who would supposedly be enthusiastic about them, do not fancy them.

Frank Lenz, chef of a restaurant frequented by brokers in Wall street, said yesterday: "The flavoring of these frogs' legs is delicious. The meat is more palatable than that of young chicken or young turkey, and it is more firm than that of the frogs which grow in marshes or streams of this state."

"In order to cook frogs' legs properly, one must get fresh mushrooms and butter. The frogs' legs should be placed right into the stew, so as to get the advantage of the juice of the mushrooms. There should be no attempt to bread the frogs' legs."

THE WORLD'S BUSINESS

Total for This Year Will Reach Enormous Figure of \$35,000,000,000.

Washington, Nov. 29. — In the present year the world's international business will reach the enormous total of \$35,000,000,000, according to a report issued today by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. The estimate is made on official returns of exports and imports from virtually every commercial country in the world. Nearly every nation reported a greater exchange of commodities than ever before had been known.

The new figure will establish a record for it is four billion dollars greater than the trade in 1910, and more than double that done in 1890, 22 years ago. Seventy leading countries furnished their figures to the Government statisticians. Only Argentina and Russia reported decreases, both falling off sharply. The United States so far has shown a monthly increase of \$18,000,000 over 1911. Canada, Haiti, Honduras and Santo Domingo do most of their shopping in the United States, according to the report, while China, India, certain of the Balkan States and Turkey look elsewhere for their purchases. The balance of trade (the difference of goods sold over those imported) still remains strongly with American manufacturers and producers, the figures showing that they enjoyed a balance on the right side of the ledger of approximately \$16,000,000.

CHINESE SCENT A WAR

'Frisco Celestials Asked to Contribute Towards Expected Conflict.

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—The Chinese Six Companies of the city of San Francisco and other Chinese organizations posted notices last night urging every Chinese to be ready to contribute at least \$10 for a fund for a war between China and Russia. This action followed the receipt here of a cablegram by a Chinese newspaper telling of the imminence of war between these two countries on account of Russia's refusal to remove troops from Mongolia.

The dispatches said that reserves were being mobilized in Mongolia, and that troops were being drilled in Canton to be in readiness for an emergency call.

It was admitted at the Chinese consulate that subscriptions had been pouring in for the war fund for the last few days in amounts ranging from \$100 to \$1,000. Many were received by telegraph from Chinese in various parts of the country.

HALIFAX CARS DEMOLISHED.

Halifax, Nov. 28.—Halifax had a heavy snow and wind storm tonight, which demolished street car traffic, and made communication by telegraph and telephone difficult. The wind was 35 miles an hour from the northeast.

Montreal, Nov. 29. — "The profession of medicine in the United States, on the whole, is working positive injury to humanity," is the opinion of Dr. Lee B. Woodcock, of Scranton, Pa., an ex-medical graduate, who for the past ten years has been practicing across the border. Disgusted with what he calls the baneful influence of the profession, he has relinquished it, and has returned to his native land.

"One hears a great deal of fake remedies," said Dr. Woodcock, "but the fakes and quackery practiced in the medical profession proper across the line are far more inimical to surgery than methods of the quack. Here's a case in point: Five years ago I was called upon to act as a consulting physician in what was to me obviously a
