## EXPLAINS CONDITIONS IN TURKEY TODAY

**Taufik Mufarrij Tells Causes of Present Warfare in Far East.**

The present war in the Balkans was discussed by Mr. Taufik Mufarrij, in his lecture on Turkey at the Tabbot Street Baptist Church on Thursday evening.

He attributed the war to four main causes: First, the disregard by the powers of the Treaty of Berlin; second, the promises made to the people of the Balkans by the Turkish Government and never kept; third, the advance in education, and fourth, the difference in religion between the Mohammedans and the Christians.

His lecture was illustrated by a series of lantern slides, the majority of which depicted scenes in the city of Constantinople. This he characterized as one of the most beautiful cities in the world.

Several views of the famous Mosque of St. Sophia, which formerly was a Christian cathedral, were shown, and he explained much of its history.

The home life of the Turk was also touched upon, and the intensity of his religious convictions.

The fearful massacre of Christians which from time to time takes place, he said, were due to the Turk's fanatical belief that he was doing the will of Allah in destroying unbelievers.

The latter half of the lecture was devoted to a vivid description of present-day conditions in the Holy Land, and included many views of the city of Jerusalem and the surrounding country.

Mr. Gilmour assumes his new duties as organist at the Church of St. John the Evangelist on Sunday next.

The preceding train had broken a piece out of the track just before the wreck. The president-elect was delayed 40 minutes, and while he was glad that the broken rail was discovered in time, he chafed some about the delay, and other passenger trains behind were sent ahead on another track, while trackmen worked on a new rail.

## GARBAGE MUST LIE THREE MONTHS MORE

Ratepayers Voted Money for Incinerator, But Completion Is Slow.

## ANOTHER SERIOUS CLASH

Contractors and City in Dispute as to Length of a Driveway.

In January, 1912, the ratepayers of London voted \$50,000 for a civic incinerator.

Twelve months and more have elapsed and not an ounce of garbage has been collected, nor has the work been far enough advanced to warrant the statement that the system of collection will be in operation three months from now. Although the plant has been almost completed, there will be many details to be worked out before the system is complete, and now another problem confronts the board of works and the city engineer.

Who will pay for the driveway from the brow of the hill to the incinerator building, a distance of 100 feet?

Out of this question arose a dispute between the contractors and the city. It is stated that three sets of plans were provided for the building when the contract was let to Laurie & Lamb, of Montreal, by the city council last year, without calling on the city and city officials are at a loss to know where they are at.

The building is located at the foot of a hill, and the feed is from the top of the building. One hundred feet from the feed platform is the top of the hill over which the garbage has to be taken to be put in the feed.

The contractors claim that the contract called for a 26-foot driveway, and the city engineer claims that it calls for a 100-foot drive.

The question has been referred to the city auditor for an opinion, and it is said that his contention is that the city can demand the long driveway from the contractors.

There are several points to be stricken out in connection with this incinerator," said A. D. Bennett, "I expect to have all the necessary information by the middle of next week, and we will go into the matter thoroughly at the next meeting."

## MERCANTILE AIR FLEET PLANNED

Graham-White Will Build It if Subsidized by the Government.

## A GRAVE WARNING

National Defence Association Want the Government to Probe Entire Military Situation.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 28.—A cable to the Tribune from London says:

A comprehensive scheme for dealing with the entire subject of an aerial fleet, and its necessary appendages has been made to the Government by Claude Graham-White. The scheme includes the establishment of a mercantile air fleet, subsidized by the Government, already existing in every large city, and around the coast, and schools for air pilots all over the United Kingdom.

It is understood that a powerful group of financiers is ready to finance any scheme having Government support for building dirigible airships simultaneously in various parts of England. Mr. Graham-White, in an interview yesterday, said:

"It is my aim to found a mercantile air-fleet on the same basis as the Cunard line. We could carry mails for the Government, and the airships could be used for general purposes in times of peace. Our proposal is cut and dried. We are prepared to do the work, provided we have Government assurance. We are prepared to foster this immense industry with private capital, and to take all the responsibility. We are ready to secure the finest skilled mechanics from all parts of Europe, and to put a mercantile air-fleet on a paying basis."

A grave warning was issued by the National Defence Association to the committee of imperial defence, which is now considering the changed aspects of the military needs of this country. It is pointed out that since the ministerial declaration regarding the territorial force, issued in 1907, circumstances have brought about a new situation, not the least important of the factors to be reckoned with being the advance in the science of aerial navigation. At present the training, equipment and numbers of the territorial force are inadequate, and the force is incapable, under present conditions, to carry out the work allotted to it.

The only way of securing the needed efficiency of the force, the memorandum declares, is by a system of national military education. Moreover, the opinion is expressed that the Government should investigate the whole military situation at home and overseas and take the nation fully into its confidence.

## ALFRED DE ORO RETAINS HIS BILLIARD TITLE

New York, Feb. 27.—Alfred De Oro retained his title of pocket billiard champion of the world tonight at the end of a three-night match with Thomas Hueston, by defeating the challenger 600 to 386. Tonight's score was: De Oro, 200; Hueston, 177.

Hueston was scuder and played better than in either of the two previous blocks of 200 points. De Oro needed one point to win in the 24th frame, but he did not succeed in scoring the necessary tally until the 27th frame.

De Oro's high run tonight was 28. Hueston's 34. Each made four scratches.

## GOVERNMENT GRANT TO HOSPITALS INCREASED

Local Institutions May Benefit by the Move—St. Joseph's Wants a Civic Grant.

## FLOODING CELLARS MAY CONTINUE FOR FIVE LONG YEARS

East London Residents Treated to Superabundance of Sewer Water.

Ratepayers residing on Florence, Frances, Eva and other streets in that vicinity in East London, are wondering when the city is going to do something to give them relief from water backing up and flooding their cellars.

Several years ago a drain was installed by the engineer's department in that section to carry away surface water, but since then the ratepayers claim that the water has been worse, and that during every small rainstorm the water backs up and floods their cellars.

Protests Filed.

Several protests have been sent to the board of works about the matter, but nothing has been done. The intention of the council is to allow matters to exist as they are until a storm water sewer is constructed, which may not be finished for five or more years. "We do not like to complain too much," said a resident of that section, "but it is nearly time the city did something for us."

"We are all workmen in this section, and the majority of us are trying to buy homes for ourselves. It is pretty hard to have to wait several months to save enough to put some small improvement on our homes, and then have water from a drain or sewer back up and destroy it all."

Ald. Bennett when informed of the conditions promised to have the engineer make an inspection of that district and make a report to the board of works at its next meeting.

## REFUSES TO SUBMIT

Mexican Federal Troops Prepare To Attack Aguascalientes.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, Feb. 28.—An attack on the rebel governor of Aguascalientes, Alberto Fuentes, will probably be opened today by a force of Government troops under Gen. Carlos Garcia Hidalgo. The state capital, Aguascalientes, has been surrounded by Government troops, who last night began a siege.

Governor Fuentes, who absolutely refuses to recognize President Huerta's Government, has taken up his position in the Government palace in the centre of the city, where he is surrounded by a force of state troops much inferior in numbers and armament to the army commanded by Gen. Hidalgo. The federal commander early this morning asked for final instructions from the central administration before beginning the attack.

## BUILDING COLLAPSED.

That the basement, into which the burning interior fell within half an hour after the fire started, contains at least fifty bodies, is the belief of Fire Chief Salter. There is no way in which to reach them for hours after the building collapsed. Only four bodies were recovered before the flames dropped the firemen from the building.

When the firemen reached the burning hotel they saw a number of persons at windows in the two upper stories. Before ladders could be raised, however, the roof began to cave in, and no one was rescued by the ladder men.

## JUMPED TO DEATH.

Charles Cuning, a bartender, who had a room on the Farnam street side of the hotel, jumped from a third story window and met instant death. He struck head-first on the sidewalk.

Mrs. C. E. Hawkins, who had a room on the second floor, dragged her sister, Miss Alice Bonnevillie, to a window. There Miss Bonnevillie collapsed. Mrs. Hawkins jumped, and though two policemen broke her fall, she was badly injured. Her sister's body is in the ruins.

Jesse D. Noid, night clerk, opened the door of his office on the second floor, when he heard an explosion. He was driven back by smoke and flames. He attempted to arouse a few guests on that floor, but soon had to seek the street to save his own life. The guests who escaped from the second story windows, or from the one entrance on the Thirteenth street side, did so in scanty attire. They were carried to a drug store across the street, and to a nearby restaurant, and later cared for at neighboring hotels.
