PAY-AS-YOU-ENTER CARS
WILL BE OPERATED IN LONDONSix of This Type Will Be Used
by Street Railway in the
Spring.

Six new cars of the pay-as-you-enter type will be in operation on the London street railway early in the spring, as delivery is expected by the management within a couple of months. The order for the cars, which are of the most modern type, was placed some time ago. The cars will have large, inclosed rear vestibules, with entrance and exit doors on the same end.

Fares will be paid into a slot operated by the conductor at the rear end of the car in the same manner as the system is worked in many American cities. It is claimed that results with this equipment are much more satisfactory both to passengers and to the company.

Fort Fraser
to Have Big
Electric Plant

Corporation Now Forming to
Furnish Fort Fraser With
Electric Power and City
Water System.

Capital of Five Million To Be
Invested in City Power and
Light, City Waterworks and
Other Industries.

Important information has just been made public regarding large developments to be made in the near future at Fort Fraser, B. C.

A corporation, to be known as the Fort Fraser Industrial Corporation, Limited, backed by some of the most influential men in the province, is to be formed for the express purpose of putting in a big power plant at Fort Fraser, and also the installation of a city waterworks system. In addition to these big improvements the corporation will take over the Fort Fraser sawmill and increase its capacity to a modern manufacturing plant for the manufacturing of all kinds of building material, including shingles, sash, door and other materials. An immense deposit has been recently discovered, and it is the intention of this corporation to acquire the deposit and erect immediately a large brick plant to make brick, tiling, pottery and other by-products.

Other improvements are contemplated, such as a manufacturing plant and store for making and marketing all kinds of furniture and household supplies.

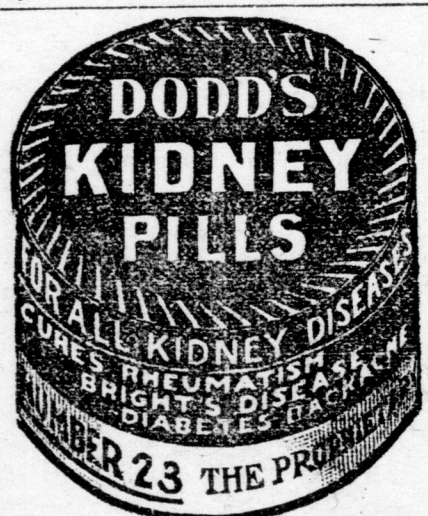
A printing plant, book bindery and paper box concern will also be among the first improvements.

Atlantic City is reached from London via G. T. Ry. to Buffalo, connecting with Penna. R. R. or Lehigh Valley to Philadelphia, connecting with the Penna. R. R. or Reading to Atlantic City; or from Buffalo via New York Central to New York City, connecting with the Penna. R. R. or Central R. R. of N. J. direct to Atlantic City.

Construction Work Stopped.

Construction work has now been concluded until the cessation of winter, but as soon as possible next spring the special work for the corner of Oxford and William streets will be laid, thus completing the loop over William and Cheapside streets, which is now being operated as a stub service from Richmond street.

This new line, together with other changes which will follow the connection of the end of the Oxford line with the Central Avenue belt by crossing the C. P. R. at Adelaide street, was announced in The Advertiser some time ago, will require several extra cars.

PHONE GIRLS WARNED
AGAINST WHITE SLAVERS

Government Tells of Method
Used to Entrap the
Unwary Ones.

New York, Jan. 4. — A cable from London says:

A warning against "white slavery" traffickers has been officially issued to the telephone girls of London after the warning given by two instances of the methods by which the unwary victims are entrapped.

The first tells of a girl operator who received a telegram purporting to be from a friend, asking for a meeting. Fortunately, the operator happened to meet the friend before the time of the appointment, and thus discovered that the telegram had come from an unknown source, and the name forged. The incident caused inquiries to be officially set afoot, resulting in the discovery that the telegram had come from a man known to be connected with the "white slave" traffic.

The second case concerned a pretty telephone operator who was met outside the exchange by a woman in the garb of a hospital nurse. The woman said that the girl's father had met with a fatal accident, and asked the girl to go to the hospital. As the girl's father had died a considerable time before, she told the nurse a mistake had been made, and the matter was reported. It is said the nurse was an agent of the "white slaves."

The warning also calls attention to the cases of drugged chocolates being sold to girls in railway trains. It would seem that recent legislation has not had all the effect that could be desired in putting an end to the activities of procurers.

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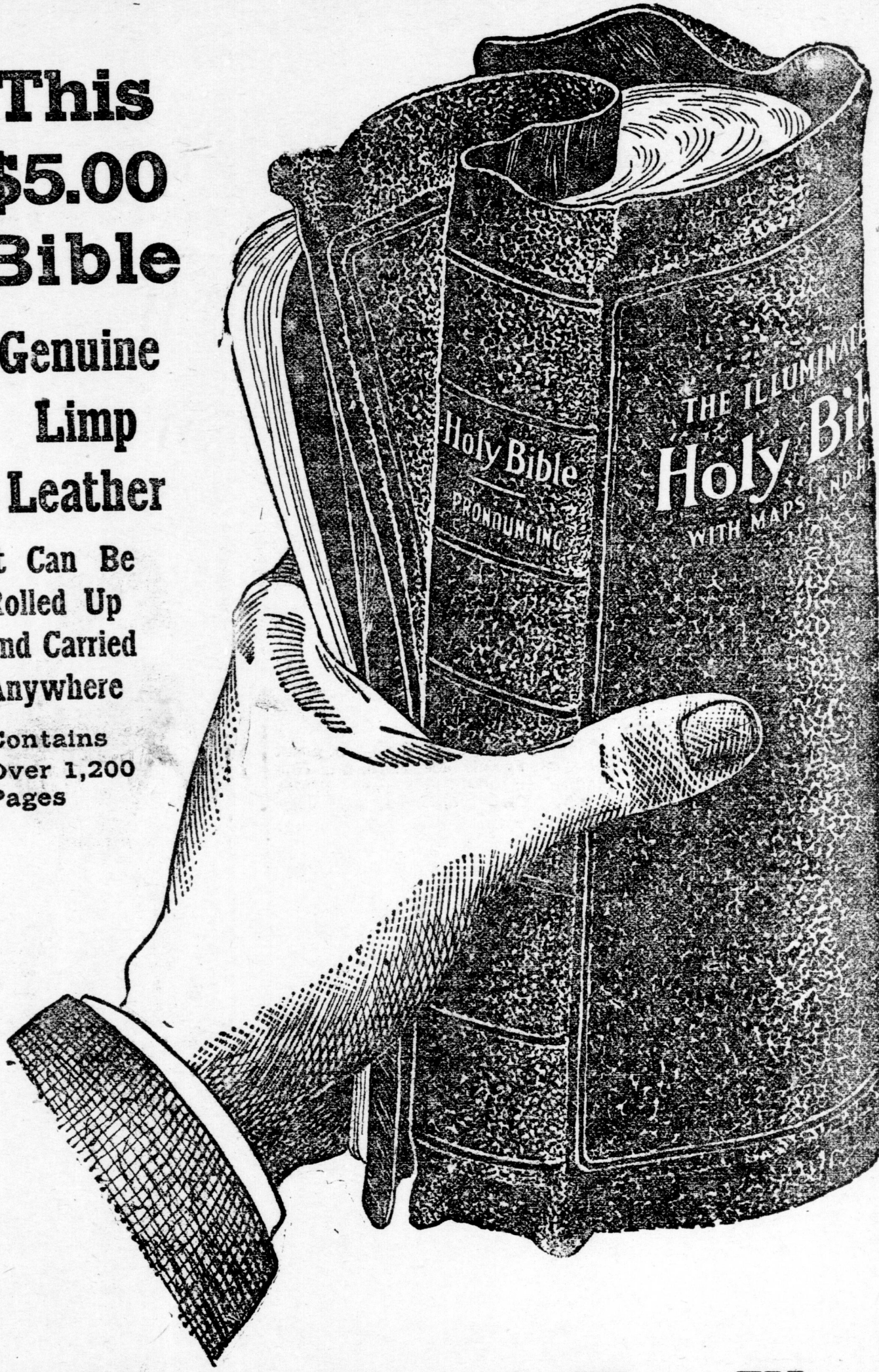
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DORCHESTER.
